MINUTES OF INAUGURAL SESSION OF 8th AGAM AND MINUTES OF THE 8th ANNUAL GENERAL ASSEMBLY MEETING (AGAM) OF THE WORLD MEMON ORGANISATION (WMO)

Minutes of the Inaugural Session of the 8th Annual General Assembly Meeting

- 1. The Inaugural Session of the 8th Annual General Assembly Meeting of the World Memon Organisation (WMO) was held at 8.30 a.m. on Saturday, 11th December 2010, at the Cinnamon Grand Hotel. Sri Lanka.
- 2. List of the members who attended the meeting is attached herewith.
- 3. The Inaugural Session started with recitation of a few verses from the Holy Quran by Hafiz Ehsan Iqbal Patel
- 4. Thereafter, the National Anthem of Sri Lanka was played. The entire gathering stood up in respect of the National Anthem of Sri Lanka.
- 5. Mr. M.H. Omar, Vice President, WMO Far East Chapter delivered the Welcome Address. He thanked the President, Vice Presidents and all others for taking time off their busy schedules to attend the 8th Annual General Assembly Meeting and others Meetings in Sri Lanka.
- 6. Mr. M.H. Omar specially thanked the President, Haji Abdul Razzak Yaqoob (ARY), stating that he was one of the pioneers of the organization. He said that another pioneer of WMO, Mr. Abubakar Cassim Pardesi, was also present in this gathering and he warmly welcomed him also.
- 7. Mr. M.H. Omar hoped that the members had pleasant memories of their previous visit to Sri Lanka and hoped that this trip would be a memorable one as well. He commended the hard work put in by the young team of WMO Sri Lanka under the guidance of Mr. A.C. Saleem and Mr. Anis Sattar for the arrangements of the meetings. He added that the theme of these meetings was 'Time for Action' with the aim to eradicate poverty and promote literacy. He said that although a lot of charity and Zakat was being given, the result so far was very poor and slow in comparison with the progress made by other communities and the reason for this slow pace was the pattern of our charity. He stressed the need to change the pattern of charity. In the end, Mr. Omar welcomed and thanked the delegates again.
- 8. Thereafter, Sir Iqbal Sacranie, Deputy President WMO, in his speech, said that it was an honor and privilege to be in Sri Lanka and that WMO has given us a sense of unity. He thanked Allah SWT for giving us the opportunity to be in Sri Lanka for a single purpose and that was to see how best the needy and the poor can be helped around the world. He said that the task before them would be much easier if the Memon Community masters its inherent quality of 'giving'. He said that the AGAM has given us the opportunity to look back at WMO's performance over the last 12 months and find ways to improve for the next 12 months.
- 9. Sir Sacranie said he would like to emphasize on three points because these were so important that we have to reiterate them every time we meet. He said that the first point was that the success of our work is guaranteed only if we follow Islamic Principles in our governance, accountability and decision-making. He said Almighty Allah has given amongst us people with great experience and knowledge to remind us of our responsibility. He said that if the World Memon Organisation (WMO) has to become the voice of the Memon Community, then unity has to be



there. He called the members to join hands and work together.

- 10. He said WMO was raising more than 5 million US dollars per annum but there was a need to improve on the transparency and governance so that more and more people can come and join WMO. He expressed his pleasure to see so many youth among the Sri Lankan hosts and called for greater involvement of the youth. He urged the members to analyze the reasons why the youth were not coming in. He also emphasized on the role of women in WMO and observed with pleasure that some of the lady members were coming to the meetings year after year.
- 11. Sir Iqbal Sacranie again referred to the speech of Mr. M.H. Omar and said we must ensure that the people don't depend on Zakat year after year. We must make them independent and for this purpose we can provide them with microfinance interest-free loans so that they can buy goods, cattle, sewing machines, etc. He quoted the example of Bangladesh where about 1.8 million people were in abject poverty yet 95% of the people pay back their microfinance loans.
- 12. He also referred to the proposal put forward by Mr. Muhammad Yousuf Adil a day before regarding Memon Micro Finance Bank and invited the members to look at the proposal in detail. He said that this day was a special day since elections were being held at Meeting for the new Board of Management. He commended the extraordinary contribution of Haji Abdul Razzak Yaqoob (ARY) as President of WMO since its inception [At this juncture, the entire gathering gave a standing ovation to Haji Abdul Razzak Yaqoob]
- 13. Sir Sacranie recalled the services rendered by the founders of WMO especially Haji Abdul Razzak and Mr. Abubakar Cassim Pardesi, both of whom were present in the meeting, and Mr. Adam Noor who was in India at the moment. In the end, he thanked Mr. A.C. Saleem, Mr. Anis Sattar and the entire team of WMO Far East Chapter for the excellent arrangements. In conclusion, he thanked and prayed to Almighty Allah for His blessings and guidance.
- 14. Mr. Anis Sattar, President of Memon Association of Sri Lanka (MASL), welcomed all to the island nation, Sri Lanka, especially the President of WMO Haji Abdul Razzak Yaqoob, the Senior Deputy President Mr. Abdul Sattar Dada, the Deputy President Sir Iqbal Sacranie and the Secretary General Mr. Pir Muhammad A. Kaliya. He said that Sri Lanka had undergone unrest for over three decades but, thanks to the President of Sri Lanka, there was peace and tranquility in the country now.
- 15. He said that the time is right and the time is now for WMO and said that the theme for the Annual General Assembly Meeting and other meetings of WMO was 'Time for Action'. He stressed the importance of imparting higher education to the students of the Memon Community. He appealed to encourage the youth to come out as professionals and gain expertise in Islamic knowledge and norms of the society. He said it was high time that WMO gets the youth involved in its activities and sports is one such means. He talked about fund raising through sports. He talked about arranging the World Memon Debate, World Memon Essay Competition and World Memon Qiraat Competition.
- 16. Mr. Anis Sattar said that WMO is unintentionally establishing itself as only as charitable organization whereas, actually, WMO was indeed an organization which united all together and the possibilities were endless. He said, "If we work in the right way, we will be united". He appreciated and saluted Haji Abdul Razzak (Haji Sahab) and thanked him. He also appreciated the excellent work done by the Memon Industrial & Technical Institute (MITI) and said a similar institute should be started in Sri Lanka as well.
- 17. Haji Abdul Razzak Yaqoob (Haji Sahab), in his speech, said that by the work we have done and



the work we do, a platform has been created. And now, the youth have to take it forward. We are all Memons and Memoni is our language but we are destroying our Memoni language by not speaking it. Memons have left their marks all over the world by building mosques, hospitals and other institutions. He expressed his pleasure to observe all sitting united here and advised all to remove differences which may arise.

- 18. Haji Sahab said WMO has to become a member of the United Nations Organization (UNO). If we do good work, then there are no shortcomings. He asked the members to forgive him if he has hurt anybody's feelings or done any mistake during his tenure as President of WMO. He also appreciated the work done by the Memon Industrial & Technical Institute (MITI) in Karachi.
- 19. In the end, Mr. Shahid Sanghani delivered the Vote of Thanks. He appreciated the excellent and hard work put in by Mr. A.C. Saleem, Assistant Secretary General, WMO Far East Chapter in making arrangements for the meetings. [Mr. A.C. Saleem was given a big hand by those present for his extraordinary services.] Mr. Shahid said that he felt a sense of unity being here even though all have diverse views. He said that the youth were actively involved in Sri Lanka. He emphasized that if WMO has to move forward then the youth and ladies have to brought in. He requested Mr. Abdul Sattar Dada, the new President of WMO, to ensure transparency in WMO and also get other critical matters resolved.
- 20. Thereafter, the inaugural session was concluded.

Minutes of the 8th Annual General Assembly Meeting of the World Memon Organisation (WMO)

- 1. After the close of the Inaugural Session, the 8th Annual General Assembly Meeting was held at 10.30 a.m. at the same venue, i.e. the Cinnamon Grand Hotel, Colombo, Sri Lanka on Saturday, 11th December 2010.
- 2. List of the members who attended the meeting is attached herewith.
- 3. Agenda Item No. 3 Approval of the Minutes of the 7th Annual General Assembly Meeting held on 12th December 2009 at Hotel Le Meridian, Dubai, U.A.E.:- The minutes were approved unanimously after being proposed by Mr. Qasim Moosa Lawai and seconded by Mr. Feizul Ayob.
- 4. Agenda Item No. 4 To receive and approve the Report of the Secretary General, WMO:- Mr. Pir Muhammad A. Kaliya, Secretary General WMO, while presenting his report said that the World Memon Organisation had come a long way since its inception on 31st March 2002 at Dubai. He said WMO was entering its ninth year of existence and every new year was bringing with it new challenges for WMO. He drew the attention of the members to the first and second Memon International Conferences held in Dubai in 2001 and 2002 respectively. At these meetings, the elders and visionaries had a vision to form an international umbrella organisation of the global Memon Community. He urged that we look back at what WMO has achieved over the last eight years and define an appropriate way forward.
- 5. He appealed to all members of WMO to work harder to make WMO stronger and help in accomplishing its vision and mission. He said that the WMO has helped thousands of needy families all over the world in times of distress and provided houses to the shelter-less, provided financial assistance to start a business or entrepreneurship, scholarships to educate their children and provided medical aid. WMO has played a key role in providing rescue, relief and rehabilitation of victims of natural calamities and social crisis.
- 6. He said that WMO has always made Education its primary goal and has decided in principle to earmark at least 60% of its funds exclusively for Education. He said over 5600 school-going children and 600 students of higher/professional education were being educated by WMO Pakistan Chapter and more than 4000 students were being financed by WMO India Chapter (out of which 1500 students were pursuing higher and professional education).
- 7. He said education was the only solution to alleviate the miseries of the thousands of the Memon families living below the poverty level and it was our duty to provide finances to such talented students so that they can become future leaders of the Memon Community. He said every single Memon child, even if he is poorest of the poor, should get education up to the highest level.
- 8. He said WMO has established a mega project called the Memon Industrial & Technical Institute (MITI) at Karachi. He saluted the untiring efforts of Mr. H.M. Shahzad for the establishment and the successful operation of MITI. He said male students were offered courses in 17 trades and presently the fifth batch was underway. He added that a separate section has been established for ladies where vocational training is being given in 11 trades and that the second batch consisting of 1600 ladies was underway. He informed the members that the City & Guilds International has recently approved MITI as a City & Guilds International Center.
- 9. He said that the WMO had recently launched a book in Urdu on the contribution of the Memon Community for Pakistan, namely Tarikh-e-Pakistan ke Gumshuda Auraaq, written by Professor



- Abdul Aziz Markatia. The Vice Chancellor of University of Karachi had been the chief guest of the ceremony, whereas Haji Sahab, President of WMO had presided over the function. Many other dignitaries from the Memon Community and the literary field had attended this ceremony.
- 10. He said that the Memon Alam, monthly magazine of the Memon Community, which is published since over 50 years, is now being published under the aegis of WMO from April 2010 onwards and many improvements have been made in the style and content. He said that 1500 copies of the Memon Alam were being published every month and each issue had its unique theme. He explained that the cost of running this magazine of international quality was very high but a sizable cost of the magazine was borne by advertisements. He requested the Memon industrials, businessmen and philanthropists to strengthen the Memon Alam by placing regular advertisements.
- 11. Referring to the Board of Management of 2008-2009, he said that the board had done a commendable job since its election to office in May 2008. The term of present Board was now coming to an end and the results of the Regional Elections held in November 2010 would be announced by the Election Commissioner. He added that the term of the present Office Bearers was also coming to an end and the new Office Bearers will be elected in the first Meeting of the new Board of Management to be held on the 11th December 2010 in the afternoon at Colombo, Sri Lanka.
- 12. The Secretary General said that the present number of Trustees was over 50, out of which 18 Trustees have paid their subscription in full. He said there were over 50 Patrons of WMO. He said the trustees strengthen the financial position of WMO and WMOCF and act as catalyst for the Memon Community. He said the number of Life and Annual members was still very low and there was urgent need to increase the number of Life and Annual Members.
- 13. With regard to the welfare activities of various WMO chapters, he said that the activities have increased multifold, particularly in India and Pakistan chapters, and huge amounts were being spent to provide financial help for education, housing, etc. Thereafter, copies of the Performance Report of each chapter, highlighting their welfare activities, were distributed to the members.
- 14. The Secretary General said that after the Pakistan floods of July 2010, more than 21 million people were rendered homeless and, at one point, approximately one-fifth of Pakistan's total land area was underwater due to the floods.
- 15. He said that the Memon Community had again stepped forward to alleviate the plight of millions through WMO, which had setup the WMO's Pakistan Flood Relief Fund to play its part in the flood relief and rehabilitation work. The Shaikhani Foundation, which is managed by the heirs of Late Mr. Abu Bakar Shaikhani, Trustee of WMO, had joined hands with WMO to jointly work for the relief and rehabilitation of the flood victims. He praised Mr. H.M. Shahzad and Mr. Mehmood Shaikhani for their immense contribution and hard work for the flood relief work.
- 16. Regarding fund raising, the Secretary General said that the welfare budget of WMO for the current year was over US \$5 million but there was an urgent need to raise additional funds to meet the requirement for education and rehabilitation.
- 17. Regarding the Audited Accounts of WMO, he said that the consolidated accounts of WMO for the year ended 31st December 2009 duly audited by Auditors, ASK Consultants UK, were being presented for review and approval. Besides, the chapter-wise Consolidated Accounts of Pakistan, Europe and Middle East, audited by the local Auditors, were also presented to members.



- 18. In the end, he thanked the President Haji Abdul Razzak Yaqoob Gandhi, Senior Deputy President Mr. Abdul Sattar Dada, Deputy President Sir Iqbal Sacranie, Mr. Solly Noor Chairman of WMOCF, Mr. Haroon Karim Deputy Chairman of WMOCF, Mr. Bashir Sattar General Secretary of WMOCF and Office Bearers of Seven Chapters.
- 19. He also thanked Mr. Muhammad Yousuf Adil, Treasurer, Mr. Abba Ali Yousuf Vice President Europe Chapter, Mr. Shoaib Ismail Mangroria Vice President Pakistan Chapter and all other Office Bearers of WMO and WMOCF for their cooperation and support in discharging his duties as the Secretary General of WMO. He was also grateful to all the Chapters for their valuable input on different matters of importance.
- 20. He expressed his gratitude to the Office Bearers and all members of the Board of Management of WMO Far East Chapter, who were kind enough to make necessary arrangements for these meetings. He thanked Mr. M. H. Omar, Vice President Far East Chapter, Mr. A. C. Saleem, Assistant Secretary General and their entire dedicated team for commendable arrangements in a very short time.
- 21. He gratefully acknowledged the generous contribution and donations of the philanthropists, Trustees, Patrons, Other Members, well-wishers for their timely contributions to WMO.
- 22. **Agenda Item No. 5 To Declare the Results of the Elections to the Board of Management:**Mr. Nowsad Gani, Election Commissioner WMO, announced the results of the Regional Elections to the Board of Management held at various chapters of WMO during the month of November 2010. At the outset, he thanked the Board of Management of WMO for reappointing him as Election Commissioner for this term as well. He said that since the WMO North America Chapter was not formally registered and had no significant activities, the regional elections were not held there. Thereafter, he announced the results of the Regional Elections held at five chapters, which are as follows:

- 24. The Election Commissioner pointed out that all the Trustees and Patrons were automatically members of the Board of Management. Mr. Pir Muhammad A. Kaliya added that the Constitution provided for two seats each for the election of lady members to the Board of Management from WMO India and Pakistan Chapters and provided for one seat each from the other five chapters.
- 25. Some comments and feedback were received regarding the Regional Elections:- Mr. Abdul Qadir Rajkotwala of WMO Pakistan Chapter said that he had sent suggestions to the Election Commissioner regarding the Election Procedures. He said at WMO Pakistan Chapter, the Members' List consisted of 661 members but contained only 263 valid voters. It means that so many members had not paid their fees. Secondly, Mr. Rajkotwala pointed out that out of the total votes cast, 50 votes were cast through proxy and this was quite a large proportion. He suggested that the Annual General Assembly Meeting be held before the Elections and that proxies should be disallowed and discontinued henceforth. Mr. Qasim Moosa Lawai, Regional Election Commissioner from WMO Pakistan Chapter said that the election procedures should be revisited.



- 26. Mr. Nowsad Gani, Election Commissioner, said that the comments of Mr. Abdul Qadir Rajkotwala regarding election procedures may be considered. Mr. Nowsad Gani recommended that a committee be formed in the next Meeting of the Board of Management to review the provisions in the Constitution of WMO regarding Elections and suggest appropriate amendments.
- 27. Mr. Abdul Hamid Nathani, Assistant Secretary General, WMO India Chapter, while commenting on the results of WMO India Chapter, said that he had doubts that some of the candidates had paid their fees. He asked the Election Commissioner as to how the results were announced without first verifying the fees paid and the eligibility of candidates to contest the elections.
- 28. To which, Mr. Nowsad Gani, Election Commissioner, replied that the WMO India chapter was not an official body in India so he had to rely on the information given to him by the Regional Election Commissioner and asked Mr. Hamid Nathani to provide any proof on the contrary, if he had any.
- 29. Sir Iqbal Sacranie pointed out that if the candidates had paid their fees, then they were eligible to contest the elections, otherwise they were not eligible. Mr. Abdul Sattar Dada was of the opinion that the Election Commissioner should not announce the results before verifying the eligibility as it would be unfair to disqualify the candidates at a later date.
- 30. Mr. Abdul Majeed Ranani, Regional Election Commissioner, WMO India Chapter, said that out of the 9 forms, he had received confirmation of payment of seven. While two of them had paid their membership fees in the form of cheques and these two members had already been members of the previous Board of Management. Mr. Abdul Majeed Ranani further said that he will hold the first meeting in India Chapter and verify the fees received and inform the Election Commissioner accordingly.
- 31. Mr. Pir Muhammad A. Kaliya, Secretary General, WMO, asked the Election Commissioner to announce the results of 4 or 5 members of India chapter who are confirmed okay. He said that Mr. Abdul Hamid Nathani, ASG, was required to provide a list of valid votes to the Regional Election Commissioner. Mr. Haroon Karim suggested that we should wait for verification and the announcements of election results be made later. Mr. Nowsad Gani, Election Commissioner, suggested that he can disqualify any member after the verification is done. Mr. Abdul Sattar Dada it was very unfair to disqualify later. Sir Iqbal Sacranie pointed out that the Elections of Vice Presidents and Assistant Secretary Generals to be held that afternoon cannot be held until the verification is complete. Mr. Bashir Sattar commented that the money received should be receipted and banked. Mr. Majieed Ranani said that this was the first time that nominations had been received and hopefully the next time will be better.
- 32. The Election Commissioner pointed out that the candidates had declared that they had paid the fees and therefore he could not defer the announcement unless there was a proof to the contrary. Thereafter, the recommendation made by the Election Commissioner was adopted. It was also decided that the election of the Vice President and Assistant Secretary General of WMO India Chapter be deferred until the verification is completed. Further, it was pointed out that it was prerogative of the Board of Management to elect the Office Bearers or otherwise, so it would be appropriate if we leave the matter to the Board.
- 33. Mr. Nowsad Gani, Election Commissioner, congratulated all the newly elected members to the Board of Management. Mr. Pir Muhammad A. Kaliya, Secretary General, WMO, requested all the elected members to send their complete contact details to the WMO Secretariat.



- 34. **Agenda Item No. 6 To receive and approve the Audited Accounts of WMO:-** The Accounts of various chapters were presented for review and approval. Mr. Muhammad Yousuf Adil, Treasurer said Consolidated Accounts of three chapters, namely Europe, Pakistan and the Middle East, were also being presented.
- 35. Sir Iqbal Sacranie explained that there was a query regarding certain liabilities and that it was not a new liability and will be clarified in due course from the Europe Chapter.
- 36. Mr. Shahid Sanghani enquired about the 'Specific Fund Deficit in Dubai' on page 5. Mr. Muhammad Yousuf Adil replied that the details of the same could be found on Page 36. Mr. Pir Muhammad A. Kaliya elaborated the details on page 36. He said that we have over-spent from the Zakat Fund. Mr. Abdul Sattar Dada said this problem has to be rectified. Mr. Shoaib Ismail Mangroria said that it was Trustees Fees and had to be recovered.
- 37. Mr. Bashir Sattar said that the accounts should be prepared according to Islamic principles. It shows interest income (Page 6 of the Consolidated Accounts) which has to be cleared up. He also questioned about Jahez Fund, saying that Jahez/Dowry is not in Islam. Mr. Pir Muhammad A. Kaliya clarified that it implied Financial Assistance for Marriage and nothing else. Mr. Bashir Sattar said that then this term Jahez should not be used anymore.
- 38. Mr. Farook Kassim said that we must not use the term 'Bond' appearing in the WMO Europe Accounts and said the term 'Sukuk' be used. Mr. Moosa Carim observed that on Page 36, the donation for mosque in Chicago has been shown as Zakat. He enquired how can zakat be given to a mosque. Mr. Pir Muhammad A. Kaliya replied that the amount given to the mosque was not zakat.
- 39. Mr. Abdul Sattar Dada said that there were some flaws in the accounts and it has been decided a day before, at the Meeting of the Board of Management that the accounts be cleaned up by 31st January 2011.
- 40. Mr. Ahmed Shaikhani enquired whether zakat was being paid on the subscription fees and property which was lying for years. Sir Iqbal Sacranie commented that it was a very good question. Mr. Bashir Sattar said that we must take Shariah advice on this matter.
- 41. Mr. Shahid Sanghani advised that all the chapters of WMO must have a uniform accounting policy so as to facilitate consolidation. He also expressed his great concern on the bank interest taken. Mr. Abdul Sattar Dada said that the interest received is given to non-Muslims as charity. Sir Iqbal Sacranie said that all this has to be sorted out. Mr. Abdul Sattar Dada added that we have 30 days to sort it out. Mr. Pir Muhammad A. Kaliya, referring to Mr. Shahid Sanghani's earlier observation, said that the accounts of Pakistan chapter adopt a common policy therefore there are no problems in consolidation. Mr. Bashir Sattar expressed his view that if a uniform policy is issued by the Treasurer, it will help resolve all such issues. Mr. Ahmed Shaikhani suggested we should use proper accounting software. Mr. Abdul Sattar Dada said we have agreed in principle to use online accounts. Mr. Solly Noor reiterated that these accounts cannot be approved at the moment. Sir Iqbal Sacranie said that we delegate the Office Bearers of WMO and WMOCF for the approval of the accounts.
- 42. Agenda Item No. 7 to receive and approve the Annual Budget and Plan of Action for the year 2010:- This matter was deferred to the next Meeting of the Board of Management.
- 43. **Agenda Item No. 8 Appointment of Auditors:** Regarding the Appointment of Auditors, it was decided to delegate the Office Bearers to reappoint ASK Consultants UK and negotiate their



remuneration.

- 44. **Agenda Item No. 9 Amendments in Clause 9.3 of the WMO Constitution:** Mr. Pir Muhammad A. Kaliya said that this Amendment regarding Institution Members will give the discretion to the WMO Chapters to take appropriate decisions in principle regarding admission or otherwise of any Jamat/Institution. Mr. H.M. Shahzad explained that the All Pakistan Memon Federation (APMF), which is an Apex Body of WMO Pakistan Chapter, has numerous Jamats and Associations as its members. The APMF has requested WMO not to admit these individual jamats as its members since these Jamats were already members of APMF.
- 45. Mr. M.H. Omar said that it was wrong to allow such rights to any chapter. Mr. Shahid Sanghani was also of the same opinion and said we must have consistency in all the chapters of WMO. Mr. Bashir Sattar observed that discretionary powers to WMO chapters would create confusion and could be dangerous. Mr. Anis Arfa, Representative of APMF, said that APMF has 37 Jamats and 20 organizations, adding up to 57 in total, as its members. Mr. M.H. Omar said that APMF was a Pakistan-based body and the WMO was an international body and so there was no justification for not allowing jamats to become members of WMO. Mr. Solly Noor expressed his agreement with Mr. Bashir Sattar and Mr. M.H. Omar.
- 46. Thereafter, the matter was put to vote. Majority of the members were not in favor of the amendments. It was therefore decided not to make any amendments in the constitution in this regard and thereafter this matter was considered closed.
- 47. **Agenda Item No. 10 Any other matter with the permission of the chair:**-Thereafter, Appreciation Awards were distributed. Mr. M.H. Omar (VP, WMO Far East Chapter) and Mr. Anis Sattar (President, MASL) presented an appreciation award to Haji Abdul Razzak Yaqoob (ARY), the outgoing President of WMO. After which, Mr. Anis Arfa and Mr. Abdul Qadir Rajkotwala presented Ajrak (Traditional Sindhi Shawl) to Mr. M.H. Omar and Mr. A.C. Saleem, Vice President and Assistant Secretary General, WMO Far East Chapter (the hosts). Haji Abdul Razzak Yaqoob presented shawls to Mr. Shoaib Ismail Mangroria and Mr. H.M. Shahzad.
- 48. Thereafter, Mr. Abubakar Siddiq Lakhani of WMO Pakistan Chapter thanked the hosts for their hospitality and excellent arrangements.
- 49. After that, Mr. Pir Muhammad A. Kaliya proposed a vote of thanks to the chair.
- 50. There being no other matter, the meeting was concluded with Dua by Mr. Pir Muhammad A. Kaliya.

Honorable President of WMO, Office Bearers of WMO, Chairman of WMOCF and Office Bearers of WMOCF and the members of the Board of Trustees, Board of Management and all other members, Assalamualaikum.

The World Memon Organisation has come a long way since its inception on 31st March 2002 at Dubai.

Over the years, the WMO has helped thousands of needy families all over the world in times of distress. WMO has provided houses to the shelter-less, provided financial assistance to start businesses to the small-scale entrepreneurs, given scholarships to educate their children and provided them with medical aid.

In times of natural calamities and social crisis, such as the Gujarat Riots of 2002, the Indian Ocean Tsunami of 2004, the Pakistan Earthquake of 2005 and the recent disastrous floods in Pakistan, WMO has played a key role in providing rescue, relief and rehabilitation for the victims of the disaster.

Education – the Primary Goal of WMO

As decided by the Board of Trustees of WMOCF, education has been the primary goal of WMO since day one and in principle at least 60% of its funds have been earmarked for Education.

Almighty Allah has bestowed our community with talent and potential, particularly the poor families. And it is our duty to provide finances to such talented students so that they become the future leaders of the Memon Community.

Our target for Education is that no single Memon child should be left without education because of the weak financial position of his family. Every single talented student should get the opportunity of getting the education up to the highest level. 1 General

Corporate Information

World Memon Organization Far East Chapter is a limited by guarantee company incorporated under section 21 of the Companies Act No. 07 of 2007 and registered as a voluntary service organization, domiciled in Sri Lanka. The address of its registered office is No. 455/12, Baudhaloka Mawatha, Colombo – 7.

1.2 Principal Activities and Nature of Operations

The principal activities of the organization are resolving the economic, social, cultural, health, rehabilitation and all related issues of the Memon Community by generating the funds from members and other fund rising activities.

Date of Authorization of Issue

The financial statements of the company for the year ended 31st December 2010 were authorized for issue by the directors on 31st March 2011.

2 Preparation of Financial Statements

The balance sheet, statement of financial activities, changes in reserve and cash flows, together with accounting policies and notes (the "financial statements") have been prepared in accordance with Sri Lanka Accounting Standards.

Basis of Preparation

These financial statements have been prepared on historical cost basis.

3 Significant Accounting Policies

Cash and Cash Equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents comprise cash in hand, demand deposits and short-term highly liquid investments readily convertible to known amounts and subject to insignificant risk of changes in value.

Income Taxes

Income tax expense represents the sum of taxes currently payable and deferred.

Current Taxes

Current income tax is based on the elements of income and expenditure as reported in the financial statements but is computed in accordance with provisions of Inland Revenue Act No. 10 of 2006 and its subsequent amendments.

Provisions

Provisions are recognized when the company has a present obligation (legal or constructive) as



a result of a past event, it is probable that the group will be required to settle the obligation, and a reliable estimate can be made of the amount of the obligation.

The amount recognized as a provision is the best estimate of the consideration required to settle the present obligation at the balance sheet date, taking in to account the risks and uncertainties surrounding the obligation. Where a provision is measured using the cash flows estimated to settle the present obligation, its carrying amount is the present value of those cash flows.

When some or all of the economic benefits required to settle a provision are expected to be recovered from a third party, the receivable is recognized as an asset if it is virtually certain that reimbursement will be received and the amount of the receivable can be measured reliably.

Income Recognition

Incoming Resources

Income from operating activities in the furtherance of the charity's objects such as grant income is recognized on cash basis.

Donation income and income from operating activities arising from fundraising events are accounted for when received. As with many similar charitable organization, independent groups from time to time organize fun raising activities and may operate bank accounts in the name of World Memon Organization Far East Chapter. However, as amounts collected in this way are outside the control of the organization, they are not included in the accounts until received by the organization.

Revenue

Other income is recognized on an accrual basis.

Expenditure Recognition

Expenses in carrying out the projects and other activities of the organization are recognized in the statement of financial activity during the period in which they are incurred. Other expenses incurred in administering and running the company are accounted for on an accrual basis and charged to the statement of financial activities.

The company has adopted the "function of expense" method to present fairly the element of company's activities in its statement of financial activities.

1. STATUS AND ACTIVIES

World Memon Organization Head Quarters is registered with Jebel Ali Free Zone Authority. Dubai and is licensed by Dubai Aid City as per License No. 75044 a d is located at International Humanitarian City, Dubai. It is a regional liaison officer for World Memon Organization incorporated in the United Kingdom (Licensee).

The Principal activity of the Organization is humanitarian services through community intervention.

The First operating license was issued by Department of Economic Development, Government of Dubai on 6 June 2005 to WHO as a nonprofit Organization

2. BASIS OF PREPARATION

a) Basis of measurement

The Financial statements are presented on the historical cost basis.

b) Functional and Presentation currency

These financial statements are presented in UAE Dirham ("AED") which is the Organization's functional currency.

c) Use of estimates and of judgments

The preparation of financial statements requires management to make judgments, estimates and assumptions that affect the application of accounting policies and reported amounts of assets, liabilities, income and expenses. These estimates and associated assumptions are based on historic experiences and various other factors that believed to be reasonable under the circumstances, the results of which form the basis of making judgment about carrying value of assets and liabilities that are not readily apparent from other sources. Actual results may differ from these circumstances.

Estimates and underlying assumptions are reviewed on an ongoing basis. Revisions to accounting estimates are recognized in the year in which the estimate is revised and in any future period affected.

3. SIGNIFICANTACCOUNTING POLICIES

The following accounting policies which comply with IFRS have been applied consistently during the year in dealing with items which are considered material in relation to the Organization's financial statements:

a) Property & equipment and depreciation

The cost of property and equipment is their purchase cost together with any incidental expense of acquisition. Depreciation is calculated so as to write off the cost of property and equipment on a straight line basis over the estimate life 5 years for furniture and



equipment.

b) Investment Property

The cost of investment property is the purchase cost together with any incidental expenses of acquisition. Depreciation is calculated so as write off the cost of investment property on a straight line basis over the estimated useful life of 20 years.

c) Impairment

The carrying amounts of the Organization's assets are reviewed at each balance sheet date to determine whether there is any indication of impairment. If any such indication exists, the asset's recoverable amount is estimated. An impairment loss is recognized whenever the carrying amount of an asset exceeds its estimated recoverable amount. Impairment losses are recognized in the income statement.

d) Revenue recognition

Ten percent (10%) of subscription received in advance is recognized as income for the year. (Note 10)

e) Foreign currency

Foreign currency transactions are translated in to Dirhams at the rate ruling on the transaction date. Foreign currency assets and liabilities are translated into Dirhams at the rate ruling at the balance sheet date. Differences on exchange are appropriately dealt with in the income statement.

f) Cash and cash equivalents

For purposes of statement of cash flow, cash and cash equivalents comprise cash bank.

01. GENERAL INFORMATION

World Memon organization (Pakistan Chapter) is a company registered with Securities and Exchange Commission of Pakistan (SECP) as a foreign Company (liaison office) under the Companies Ordiance,1984 on April 14,2003 .The registered office of the Company is situated at London.

The principal activities of the Company is the promotion ,advancement, uplifument ,Unity., Welfare, and wellbeing of the Memon community.

1.1. Functional Currency

The Financial statements of the company is presented in Pakistani Rupees, which is the functional and presentational currency.

02. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

2.1 Statement of Companies

These financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the requirements of Companies Ordinance, 1984(the ordinance) and directions issued by the Securities and Exchange Commission of such International Accounting standards as notified under the provisions of the Ordinance. Whether, the requirements of these standards, the requirements of the Ordinance or the requirements of the said directives take precedence.

2.2. Basis of preparation

These financial statement have been prepared under historical cost convention.

2.3. Revenue and Expenditure reorganization

- (a) revenue is recognized on the following basis:-
 - -Annual members (Ordinary / Apex / Institutions / Cooperate) on accrual basis
 - Life members and patrons Evenly over 10 years
- (b) Expenses are accounted for on accrual basis.
- (c) Interest income and expense is not recognized and treated as a liability. The net amount charged in the income and expenditure account is donated for charitable purpose according to the Islamic principles.

2.4. Operating fixed assets

Operating fixed assets at cost less accumulated depreciation. Depreciation is charged to income applying the reducing balance method at the rates specified in respective note.

Full year's depreciation is charged in the year of addition while no depreciation is charged in the year of disposal.

Maintenance and normal expenses are charged to income as and when incurred.

Gains and losses on disposal of fixed assets is recognized in the income and expenditure account.



2.5. cash and Equivalent

cash and equivalents are carried in the balance sheet at cost. For the purpose of cash flow statement, cash and cash equivalents consist of cash in hand balances, with banks.

2.6. Other payable

Liabilities for the payable are carried at cost which is the fair value of the consideration to be paid in the future for goods and services received whether billed to the Company or not.

2.7. Other Receivable

Other receivables are carried at committed less an estimate made for doubtful receivables based on review of outstanding amounts at the year end. Balances considered bad and irrecoverable are written off when identified.

2.8. Impairment

The company assesses at each balance sheet date whether there is any indications that assets except deferred tax assets may be impaired. If such indication exists, the carrying values exceed the respective recoverable amount, assets are written down to their recoverable amounts and the resulting impairment loss is recognized in profit and loss account. The recoverable amount is the higher of an asset's fair value less costs to self and value in use.

where impairment loss subsequently reverses, the carrying amount of the asset increased to the revised recoverable amount but limited to the extent of initial cost of the asset. Reversal of impairment loss is recognized as income.

The gain or loss on disposal or retirement of an asset represented by the d i f f e r e n c e between the sale proceeds and the carrying amount of the asset is recognized as an income or expense.

2.9. Financial Instrument

Financial assets include improvements carried out on MITI building and have finite useful lives are measured at cost less accumulated amortizations les impairment in value, if any.

2.10 Intangible Assets

Intangible assets include improvements carried on MITI building and have finite useful lives are measured at cost less accumulated amortization less impairment in value, if any.

Amortization is recognized in income and expenditure account on a straight line basis over the period of five years.

Changes in the Standing Orders of World Memon Organisation (WMO)

S.O.4. has been amended keeping in view the proposals received after the last Elections to avoid bottlenecks. The Election Commissioner has been empowered to change the time schedule in extenuating circumstances

S.O.4. ELECTION PROCEDURES

The present Standing Order 4 pertaining to Election Procedures shall be replaced by the following new S.O.4:-

S.O.4 Election Procedures

- S.O.4.1. The Election Commissioner (EC) shall appoint Regional Election Commissioner (REC) at least 17 weeks before the date of elections to hold elections in the respective regions.
- S.O.4.2. The EC shall announce the date of elections at least 17 weeks before the elections.
- S.O.4.3. The Regional Election Commissioners so appointed shall be responsible for all arrangements, both primary and incidental, to the election process in the respective regions and for this purpose the Regional Election Commissioners shall have access to the office facilities and records of the WMO.
- S.O.4.4. The Apex Body shall notify the Assistant Secretary General of the region of the names of their representatives at least 16 weeks prior to the date of elections indicating that which of their representative shall be a member of the Board of Management.
- S.O.4.5. The Institution Members and Corporate Members shall notify the Assistant Secretary General of the region of the names of their appointed representatives at least 16 weeks prior to the date of elections. Member organizations, institutions and corporate bodies shall notify the Assistant Secretary General of the region of the names of their appointed representatives or their alternatives at least 13 weeks prior to the date of elections.
- S.O 4.6. It is up to each Apex, Institution and Corporate Member of the WMO to decide how its representatives are appointed.
- S.O.4.7. The Assistant Secretary General of each region shall submit the list of eligible voters to the REC at least 15 weeks before the election.

- S.O.4.8. The Regional Election Commissioner shall issue a list of the members who are eligible to cast vote for election, at least 14 weeks before the date of the election.
- S.O.4.9. If any individual member has any objection to the list of members who are eligible to case vote for election, he should intimate the Regional Election Commissioner, within 4 days of the issue of the list of voters, who will take appropriate decision within 3 days of the receipt of such objection.
- S.O.4.10. Any individual member, nominees of any Institution or Corporate Member who wishes to stand for election on the Board, shall notify the Regional Election Commissioner of his or her intention at least 12 weeks prior to the date of election. It may be clarified that a lady member can also contest the election on the general seat.
- S.O. 4.11. Any lady member who wishes to stand for election on the Board, on the reserved seats for ladies under Clause 22.2.1.(ix), shall also notify the Regional Election Commissioner of her intention at least 12 weeks prior to the date of election
- S.O.4.12. The Regional Election Commissioner shall prepare two lists of the candidates (one for general seats and other for ladies reserved seats) in alphabetical order who have expressed their intention to stand for election within 3 days of the receipt of the nomination papers
- S.O.4.13. In case any member has any objection to the inclusion of any of the candidate(s), he/she should inform the Regional Election Commissioner within one week of issuance of the list of candidates. The Regional Election Commissioner shall take appropriate decision within 3 days of the receipt of such objection.
- S.O.4.14. In case the nomination paper of any of the candidates has been rejected by the Regional Election Commissioner, he/she shall, if he/she so desires, can file an appeal within 4 days before the Election Commissioner, who in turn will take appropriate decision on the petition within 3 days of the receipt of such objection and whose decision shall be final
- S.O.4.15. In case a candidate wants to withdraw his/her nomination, he/she can do so by intimating the Regional Election Commissioner within 10 days of date of issue of the list of the candidates.
- S.O.4.16. Within one week of the filing of the nomination, the candidates shall send their profiles in the form duly prescribed for this purpose and submit the same to the Regional Election Commissioner. The Election Commissioner shall circulate the profile of the candidate to all the members entitled to vote within 2 weeks.
- S.O.4.17. The Regional Election Commissioner shall issue the final list of the candidates before 8 weeks of the date of elections
- S.O.4.18. The election shall be held at a place designated by the Regional Election Commissioner from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. without any break. The venue of election shall be announced by the Regional Election Commissioner at least 2 weeks before the elections.
- S.O.4.19. The decision of the Regional Election Commissioner regarding any voter shall be final.

- S.O.4.20. The venue and date of election may be changed by the Regional Election Commissioner, if he deems fit, in consultation with the Election Commissioner. The change of the venue/date of election shall immediately be intimated to all concerned.
- S.O.4.21. The candidates may appoint maximum of two agents who shall be members of the WMO and the candidate shall notify the same to the Regional Election Commissioner 48 hours before the election.
- S.O.4.22. Immediately after the election, the Regional Election Commissioner shall count the votes and prepare the list of the candidates according to the number of votes procured by the candidates, in descending order. One agent of each candidate will be allowed to oversee the counting.
- S.O.4.23. The list of successful candidates shall be declared as elected by the Regional Election Commissioner. However, if a lady member has been elected on both seats, i.e. general seat and seat reserved for ladies, she will be required to intimate to the Regional Election Commissioner her decision to release one of the seats immediately.
- S.O.4.24. The elected lady member shall intimate the REC about her decision to release one seat. In case the lady releases the general seat, the candidate who was acquired highest votes after the elected candidates shall be declared as elected. In the same manner, if the lady releases the ladies seat, then the lady candidate who has acquired the highest votes after the elected candidates shall be declared as elected.
- S.O.4.25. The Regional Election Commissioner shall send to the Election Commissioner the details of the votes procured by candidates and the list of the successful candidates.
- S.O.4.26. The Election Commissioner shall announce the overall result of the election, of different regions, at the ensuing Annual General Assembly Meeting.
- S.O.4.27. The Election Commissioner and/or the Regional Election Commissioner(s) in consultation with the Election Commissioner, in certain extenuating circumstances, may vary the timeframes of the Elections, etc.
- S.O.4.28. Oath of Newly Elected Board Members:
 - S.O. 4.28.1. At the first meeting of the Board of Management held after the election at the General Assembly Meeting, the Chairman will ask all members of the Board to take the following oath:
 - "May Allah bear witness that in the discharge of my duties as a Member of the Board of Management of the World Memon Organisation, I shall at all times seek to serve the Memon community in particular and Muslims in general and to work for the common good in accordance with the Holy Qur'an and the Sunnah of the Prophet Muhammad, may Allah bless him and grant him peace."

REPORT OF THE WORLD MEMON ORGANISATION

Honorable President of WMO, Office Bearers of WMO, Chairman of WMOCF and Office bearer of WMOCF and the members of the Board of Trustees, Board of Management and all other members. Assalamu Alaikum.

WMO has completed its first decade of service to humanity. This 10th year is a crucial point in the history of WMO. It is a stage where we have to look back at the past and also look forward into the future. It is point in time when the last ten years have to be reviewed and the next ten years have to be planned.

This is a momentous occasion for WMO and all its Members and Office Bearers who have strived so hard over the years to pursue the mission of WMO. I congratulate each and every Office Bearer, past and present, and all members of WMO, and the Memon Community in general, on the completion of ten years of WMO. It is indeed a milestone.

We have to pay homage to the founders of WMO - Late Mr. Abdul Razzak Tasty, Late Mr. Latif Ebrahim Jamal, Haji Abdul Razzak Yaqoob (ARY), Mr. Abubakar Cassim and Mr. Adam Noor, who had a far-reaching vision for the Memon Community. The achievements of WMO are in-line with their vision but WMO has only managed to achieve a very small portion of its mission. WMO has to do a lot more in the coming years.

The general impression about the Memon Community is that it is a community of very rich and influential people since many renowned businessmen, industrialists, social workers, professionals and philanthropists hail from this community. This is indeed a blessing from Almighty Allah.

The state of affairs of a large number of Memons is not so good. Many are struggling to eek out a decent living and have to live in ramshackle homes which do not even have the basic amenities. Besides, problems of illiteracy, unemployment and poverty in the Memon Community has reached alarming levels in the community and extravagant customs are taking their toll.

The World Memon Organisation (WMO) has been, over the last ten years, trying to address these issues. But the progress has been slow. WMO has now completed a decade of service to humanity and has to make concrete plans for the decade to come.

We all understand that Education is the key to prosperity and WMO has to concentrate on Education because even if one member of a Memon family is well-educated, then the entire family leaps towards prosperity.

It is important to mention here that WMO has made some progress in its mission to educate the youth of the Memon Community. The Education for All Scheme of WMO Pakistan Chapter presently has about 8,500 students, the Higher & Professional Education Scheme has 900 students and the Memon



Industrial & Technical Institute (MITI) has about 6,000 students.

Similarly, WMO India Chapter is providing help to thousands of school children and hundreds of students of higher and professional education.

This is indeed a remarkable achievement. WMO has to strive harder to educate more and more youth of the Memon Community.

In order to continue and enhance the Education Schemes of WMO in Pakistan and India, we need huge funds. Almighty Allah has blessed the Memon Community with wealth coupled with philanthropic qualities. There is a need that all the members of the Memon Community should give preference to WMO and make it a point to give the maximum amount of their Zakat & Donations for the community. Almighty Allah has revealed in His Holy Book that the parents and relatives should been given preference over others as far as Zakat & Donations are concerned.

Education is the key to prosperity and WMO should launch a mega education endeavor for the next ten years. I hope the Board of Trustees of WMOCF, the Board of Management of WMO and General Body would pass a unanimous resolution to take the Education Schemes of WMO to a newer level.

Housing is another major issue faced by a majority of families in the Memon Community. Memons in India, Pakistan and Sri Lanka have to undergo great pains just to make both ends meet and a shelter over their heads would provide them much relief. The Rehabilitation Schemes of WMO in Pakistan and India have done considerable work but a large number of families are stilling waiting for WMO to provide them a permanent shelter over their heads. For this, WMO had to make concrete plans for the next ten years to tackle the housing issues faced by the Memon Community.

Chief Operating Officer (COO)

The WMO was in search of a good Chief Operating Officer (COO) to oversee and coordinate the various activities of WMO chapters. Mr. Shahid M. Sangani has been appointed as COO since April 2011. The work of WMO has since then been streamlined and it is hoped that in future, the pace of the work would be enhanced.

Membership of WMO

The membership of WMO in various chapters is very, very low. Even after the passage of one decade, the total membership has not crossed 1,000. This is something which the Board of Management of WMO and the Board of Trustees of WMOCF should seriously consider during the meetings in London.

WMO is introducing a new category of membership, namely "Friends of WMO". This category is open to all Memons and the members are not required to contribute any fees. However, they are required to agree to the Aims and Objects and to pledge that they would work with the WMO to pursue its Mission for the welfare and well-being of the Memon Community.

The Office Bearers of each chapter are requested to give special attention to enhance the number of members so as to strengthen the WMO at chapter level.

Amendments in the Constitution of WMO and WMOCF

Amendments in the Constitution of WMO and WMOCF are made from time to time as the organizations make progress over the years. This time, a number of proposals have been prepared which will be placed before the General Body for approval.



Registration of WMO in India under the Societies Act

We are pleased to state that WMO has been registered as a Society under the Societies Act. A Memorandum of Understanding has been signed between WMO and WMO India Chapter for mutual cooperation. It is hoped that the welfare activities of WMO in India would be increased considerably.

Visit of the WMO President and Other Foreign Delegates to India and Pakistan

The President of WMO, Mr. Abdul Sattar Dada, along with a team of delegates set out on a tour of India and Pakistan in April 2011. The trip to both countries was very fruitful. Many functions were held in their honor by the host countries.

Meetings of the foreign delegation with the Heads of State of India and Pakistan

The President of WMO, Mr. Abdul Sattar Dada, along with a high-powered delegation, had a meeting with Srimati Pratibha Devisingh Patil (President of India), Mr. Hamid Ansari (Vice President of India) and also had a meeting with Mr. Asif Ali Zardari (President of the Islamic Republic of Pakistan).

WMO President's Housing Scheme

Mr. Abdul Sattar Dada, President of WMO, on his visit to Karachi in April 2011 launched the WMO President's Housing Scheme wherein the cost of each house was Rs.1 million (US \$ 12,000). We are pleased to inform you that, at the venue of the announcement itself, 30 houses were committed by the philanthropists of the Memon Community.

We humbly request the Trustees, Patrons, donors and other well-wishers of the Memon Community to come forward and announce their support to the WMO President's Housing Scheme for the betterment of the community at large.

Memon Industrial & Technical Institute (MITI)

MITI is a unique Institute of international standards in the city of Karachi, which is proving to be a boon for the young men and women of this Metropolis.

Currently, 1500 male students are being given training in 26 different trades. The 8th batch is underway. Most of the students, after completing the training, are either self-employed or have procured jobs in various industries. Some students have also got jobs abroad.

A separate section has been established exclusively for ladies where vocational training is given in 17 trades. Now the 6th batch with 4,500 ladies is underway.

Memon Institute of Hijama Therapy

The World Memon Organisation recently launched the Memon Institute of Hijama Therapy in a separately constructed building at MITI. The Institute has started providing both treatment and training in Hijama Therapy.

Memon Alam

More than two years have passed since WMO has started publishing the magazine. Till date 25 issues have been published. Every issue has its unique theme.

The cost of running this magazine of international quality is very high. However, a sizable cost of the magazine is being borne through advertisements. We request the Memon industrialists, businessmen and philanthropists to please strengthen the Memon Alam by placing regular advertisements. At present, only 1,500 copies are being published but the Memon Alam Committee intends to increase the number of copies to 5,000. All this requires your cooperation and support. I am sure that the



members present here will help Memon Alam by placing advertisements.

Flood Relief Work

The Memon Community had stepped forward to alleviate the plight of millions of displaced and desperate flood victims of 2010 and 2011 through WMO, which setup the WMO's Pakistan Flood Relief Fund for flood relief and rehabilitation work. The Shaikhani Foundation, Muhammad Yousuf Adil Salim & Co., the Rehnuma Trust, the Dhoraji Memon Association and others had joined hands with WMO to jointly work for the relief and rehabilitation of the flood victims.

Memon Census

The World Memon Organisation (WMO) has decided to conduct a census of the Memon Community around the world, which would help the World Memon Organisation (WMO) to prepare an appropriate strategy for the welfare and well-being of the community. The various chapters of WMO are not taking this item as very serious and it appears only WMO Pakistan Chapter is conducting the Census work in a systematic manner.

I request all the VPs and ASGs and the Boards of Management of different chapters to please give this item top priority as otherwise WMO will not be able to achieve the targets of eradicating unemployment, illiteracy and poverty in the community.

Youth Wings of WMO

The Memon Community cannot ignore the importance of the youth for providing future leadership. The chapters are urged to please promote youth activities like sports, seminars, get-togethers within their region as well as internationally.

Ladies Wings of WMO

It is pleasing to note that the Ladies at WMO chapters are doing commendable work. They regularly hold get-togethers, seminars, exhibitions and other women related programs for the benefit of the Memon ladies.

The Chairperson of Ladies Wing of WMO Pakistan Chapter had suggested that the members of the ladies wings of all chapters should have a meeting every year at the time of the Annual Assembly Meetings.

Micro Finance

There is a need to encourage Small & Medium Memon Enterprises of the Memon Community by providing them with interest-free loans so that they can earn their livelihood in a respectable manner.

In Pakistan, the WMO has launched a Micro Finance Scheme and also the Rozgar Scheme to help the needy families. Under the Micro Finance Scheme, small loans up to Rs. 25,000 (US \$270) are given to Memon micro entrepreneurs. In the same manner, Auto Rickshaws and Sewing Machines are also provided under the WMO Rozgar Scheme with the courtesy of a generous donor from UAE.

The Annual General Meeting of WMO at London

This is the first time that WMO is holding its Annual General Assembly Meeting and all other meetings in London on the invitation of the WMO Europe Chapter. Though, there was an apprehension that people from Pakistan and India would not be able to get the visas but we are pleased to state that most of the applicants from Pakistan and India have been successful in getting visas.

In these meetings, the honorable members would be taking appropriate decisions for the welfare and well-being of the posterity of the Memon Community.



WMO Audited Accounts

We are pleased to inform you that the consolidated accounts of WMO for the year ended 31st December 2011 which have been audited by our Auditors, ASK Consultants UK, are presented herewith for your review and approval.

During the period, we had two board meetings, five meetings of the office bearers and six conference calls between office bearers. Further two meetings took place between office bearers and the auditors. Numerous calls between office bearers in the UK and WMO Office bearers overseas also took place.

2. Memon Organisations in the UK

There are two main Memon Organisations in the UK, namely Memon Association UK and Memon Association Leicester. Both these organisations provide community and welfare activities to Memons residing in London and Leicester. Both these institutions have their own Centres which provide recreational activities to the elderly and the youth.

3. Zakat Collection

The WMO in conjunction with the Memon Association UK and Memon Association Leicester, made great efforts to collect Zakat last Ramadhan. For the first time around five hundred Zakat appeal letters bearing the signatures of President of WMO ,President of the Memon Association UK, President of the Memon Association Leicester, were sent out to all members of the Memon Community who were on our data base in London and Leicester. This bought awareness of WMO to



a large number of the Memon Community in the UK. The response for the Zakat was poor, mainly because the letter went out late in the month of Ramadhan. This year Insha Allah we shall send out a letter much earlier and therefore we expect to achieve a better response.

4. Donations

We made a commitment of USD \$150,000 which included USD \$50,000 for MITI, which is payable by the end of the year. We sent USD \$15,000 to the Memon Medical Institute in Mombasa, Kenya. Approx USD \$10,000 was sent to the Widows Project in India. Approx \$8000 was sent to The Cleft Lip/Palate Clinic in Hyderabad for children. Insha Allah we hope to commit more next year for the WMO Projects in India and Pakistan.

5. Welfare Activities

Europe and especially UK has its own welfare system which provides legal aid, housing support, medical aid as well as different kinds of benefit support to those in need. However, for our Memon community, we are providing additional free consultancy services in the legal, medical, and dental fields. These services are advertised on the website. We have regional counsellors giving advice on matrimonial and family matters. A London wide helpline has been established for our community.

A Memon Connection service exists which introduces young persons and their families to other Memon families. Eight ladies from the Ladies Wing have been designated to operate this service under the supervision of the Convenor of the Welfare Committee. Through this service we have had many successful marriages. This service also exists online and we hope to extend it through the WMO website into a worldwide introduction service.

6. Youth Wing

The Youth Committees in both London and Leicester provide recreational and sport activities such as volleyball, basketball and badminton. They also organise monthly functions for families to get together and meet other families in the community.

7. Ladies Wing

The Ladies Wing is very active with the Memon Connections, organising various charity events. Two charity functions were held last year and the money collected was sent to WMO Widow and Orphan Project in India. Yoga and swimming classes are successfully run by the committee for our ladies. Islamic lectures are also organised at the Memon Centre especially during the Muharram period.

8. Social Activities

The Memon Association UK and the WMO are working hand in hand to organise social events during the year. Throughout the year, we have two Eid functions, one before Ramadhan ('Welcoming Ramadhan') function, a summer barbecue, Milad Un Nabi and one annual 'get together' function. These functions are heavily subsidised and very popular with an attendance of over 600 people.

In 2012 we hope to celebrate the 35th anniversary of Memon Association UK. This grand occasion will attract our community from all around the UK as well as dignitaries and senior officials. We hope to give maximum exposure to the activities of the WMO during this event.



9. Membership

We have visited several centres in and around London to create awareness of the WMO. We hope to take this further to Leicester, Dundee and various places in Europe by next year.

We have enrolled some new life members. We hope the WMO AGM in London will give a huge boost to membership drive.

At this stage a census of Memons living in the UK is not possible but inshallah we are in the process of developing a system that will enable to carry out the Census efficiently.

10. Award and Special Recognition

Dr Esmail Harunani, Vice President of the Europe Chapter attained the Diploma of Fellowship of the Faculty of General Dental Practice (UK) (FFGDP[UK]) which marks the end of the Career Pathway and gives dental practitioners in the UK the opportunity to demonstrate that all that has been learned from a programme of structured continuing education and training has been put into practice, and the practice and practitioner are capable of delivering the highest standards of patient care. He is the first Memon in the world to have achieved this.

11. WMO Newsletter

The Memon Association UK and the Europe chapter publish a quarterly newsletter which is distributed in the UK. Memon Alam is also distributed to committee members and other senior members in the UK.

12. Audited Accounts

The audited accounts for 2010 and 2011 have been finalised and audited. These accounts will be presented at WMO AGM and then filed with the companies house and charity commission.

1. Introduction

The Far East Chapter of the WMO is one of the 7 Chapters established under the constitution of the WMO and covers a vast region of Asia, less Middle East, India and Pakistan.

However at present the Membership and the Activities of Far East Chapter has been confined to Sri Lanka (of the 45 members in Far East, expect for a member each from Japan and Singapore all other members are from Sri Lanka). However as a Chapter, The Far East Chapter has been a regular contributor to the WMO, chief among this been as a Host for the AGM's on two occasions.

The Chapter was the host to the 8th AGM (last AGM) of the WMO, which was held in Dec'10 in Colombo with the participation of over 100 overseas delegates. The Mantel of the Presidency of WMO passed from founder President Haji Abdul Razzak Gandhi (ARY) to Abdul Satar Dada at this AGM. The delegates were hosted to a Gala Dinner by the WMO Far East Chapters in addition to many other social and community interactions

The Chapter recognizes the need to expand out from Sri Lanka to become a truly Far Eastern Chapter and plans are being made to expand the Chapter membership and activities to Malaysia, Bangladesh and Myanmar (Burma) in 2012

In Sri Lanka, the Chapter has focused all it activities to be carried out in Partnership with the Memon Association of Sri Lanka (MASL) for maximum impact and avoid duplication of efforts. Hence the WMO FC has supported the MASL programs of Housing, Education and Medical Aid by contributing Zakath donations for these programs. In addition Far East Chapter conducted continues education programs for Adults in partnership with MASL and sponsors the Winner's Trophy at the Annual Six A. Side Cricket tournament organized by MASL

This year Far East Chapter also sponsored the development and hosting of the new WMO Web Site (www.memonworld.com). The Web site has been developed to address a gap in the WMO reach to the community and has many features and pages to take the message of WMO to the world and keep the members and the global memon community upto date on the activities of the WMO.

The Chapter also sponsored 50% of the Printing and Publication of The WMO Annual Report and the Working Papers for the 9th and 10th AGM to be held in London in June'12

The Board met 5 times during 2011 to discuss various matters pertaining to the Chapter issues with over 60% participation of BOM Members

3. Zakath Collection

Due to the Exchange Control Regulation of Sri Lanka, the Chapter is unable to remit any Zakath Collections from Sri Lanka to the main body. Hence the chapter has committed to contribute US\$ 200,000 to the Memon Association of Lanka for their Zakath Projects, mainly Housing, Education and Medical. The chapter was able to exceed their commitment and has actually committed Rs 31M (approximately US\$ 270,000) to MASL.

Of this Rs 13.5M has already been paid and the balance Rs 17.5M will be paid before Ramadan. (The payment by the Donors is done directly to MASL in order to avoid taxation)

The Zakath was collected through One on One discussions and this year too the Chapter is confident of collecting over Rs 30M of Zakath for contribution to MASL.

Further a sum of Rs 100,000 Zakath Contributed by a Well Wisher was in turn given to Memon Support Charitable Trust towards their Zakath projects.

The Chapter is also hoping to contribute US\$ 50,000 to \$100,000 towards the Main Body in 2012

4. Donations

At the AGM held in Colombo in Dec'10, Far East Chapter Trustee Mr Eliyas A. Kareem pledge a donation of US\$ 50,000 towards the running expenses of MITI on a special request from Pakistan Chapter. This sum was thereafter paid by 'Mr Eliyas A Kareem and duly acknowledged by WMO PC.

The Far East Chapter launched a special appeal among the Memon Community on appeal from WMO Pakistan Chapter during the Floods in Pakistan in 2011 and a Sum of Pak Rs 500,000 was collected from Members and Well Wishers to contribute towards Flood Relief Fund of WMO PC.

5. Welfare Activities Carried out

Education – The chapter organized two Education Seminars during the period in partnership with the Memon Association of Sri Lanka. These programs are a part of Adult Continues Education Seminars planed to be held on regular basis by the Chapter. The aim of these programs is to create continues awareness among the community to move with the times and create a Knowledge Community keeping to the saying of our Prophet Mohamed (SAW) –

The programs were conducted by a well know trainer, Mr Riaz Hassan with a wide participation from the members of the community

Micro Finance – A Micro Finance Scheme has been devised by the Chapter to provide small business loans to members of the community with the objectives of making the receipt self reliant and become Zakath contributors in the future. A Sum of Rs 15M from the Trustee Funds in the Chapter has been pledged towards this scheme. The screening process was started in Dec'11 and the dispersement has commenced in Feb'12.

6. Social Activities Carried out

Youth/Sports Activity – **WMO Trophy** was awarded once again to the Winner of the Memon Six A. Side Cricket Tournament. The tournament is organized annually by the Memon Association of Sri Lanka

The Winner of the Memon Indoor Cricket Tournament was awarded the WMO Trophy. This tournament was organized by Zeus Sports Committee, consisting of Memon Boys from the community

Social Activities – Sponsored the Eid Milan Program organized by the Young Memon's on Ramadan Eid Day.

1. General

Corporate Information

World Memon Organization Far East Chapter is a limited by guarantee company incorporated under section 21 of the Companies Act No: 7 of 2007 and registered as a voluntary service organization, domiciled in Sri Lanka. The address of its registered office is No 455/12, Bauddhaloka Mawatha, Colombo -7.

1.2 Principle Activities and Nature of Operations

The principle activities of the organization are resolving the economic, Social, Culture health rehabilitation and all related issues of the Memon Community by generating the funds from members and other fund from members and other fund rising activities.

Date of Authorization of Issue

01. Preparation of Financial Statements

The balance sheet, statement of financial activities, Changes in reserve and cash flows, together with accounting policies and notes (the "financial statements") have been prepared in accordance with Sri Lanka Accounting Standards.

Basis of preparation

These financial statement have been prepared on historical cost basis.

02. Significant Accounting Policies

Cash and Cash Equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents comprise cash in hand, demand deposits and short-term highly liquid investment readily convertible to known amounts and subject to insignificant risk of changes in value.

Income Taxes

Income tax expense represent the sum of taxes currently payable and deferred.

Current Taxes

Current income tax is based on the elements of income and expenditure as reported in the financial statements but is computed in accordance with provisions of Island Revenue Act No. 10 of 2006 and its subsequent amendments.

Provisions

Provisions are recognized when the company has a present obligation (legal or constructive) as a result of a past event, it is probable that the group will be required to settle the obligation, and a reliable estimate can be made of the amount of the obligation.

The amount recognized as a provision is the best estimate of the consideration required to settle the present obligation at the balance sheet date., taking in to account the risk and uncertainties surrounding the obligation. Where a provision is measured using the cash flows estimated to settle the present obligation, its carrying amount of the present value of those cash flows.



When some or all of the economic benefits required to settle a provision are expected to be recovered from a third party, the receivable is recognized as an asset if it is virtually certain that reimbursement will be received and the amount of the receivable can be measured reliably.

Income Recognition

Income Resources

Income from operating activities in the furtherance of the charity's objects such as grant income is recognized on cash basis.

donation income and income from operating activities arising from fundraising events are accounted for when received. As with many similar charitable organizations, independent group from time to time organize fun raising activities and may operate bank accounts in the name of World Memon Organization Far East Chapter, However, as amounts collected in this way are outside the control of the organization, they are not included in the accounts until received by the organization.

Revenue

Other income is recognized on an accrual basis.

Expenditure Recognition

Expenses in carrying out the projects and other activities of the organizations are recognized in the statement of financial activity during the period in which they are incurred. Other expenses incurred in administrating and running the company are accounted for on an accrual basis and charged to the statements of financial activities.

The company has adopted the "function of expense" method to present fairly the element of company's activities in its statement of financial activities.

Back Ground

A Delegation of Senior WMO Officials including the President Satar A Dada, Senor Deputy President Sir Iqbal Sacrani, General Secretary WMO CF Feizul Ayub, Trustee Syed Mia and others visited India in April'10 to look into this matter and held meeting with the President and Vice President of India to obtain their assistance in resolving this matter. Historically in the past Middle East Chapter has been one of the largest contributors to the WMO Zakath Funds. However since the recent turmoil in the economy of Middle East and of Dubai, the businesses have suffered greatly and this has resulted in a reduced flow of Zakath Commitments from our Memons.

BOM Member (Co-Opted)

At the AGM held in Colombo, a total sum of US\$ 1.0M was committed from the Middle East Chapter. Of this US\$ 500,000 was committed by Mr Farook Cassim and connected parties for India (\$300,000) and US\$ (200,000) Sri Lanka. Since then Donor have decided to channel their commitment direct to India and Sri Lanka though different organization hence the Middle East Commitment has been reduced to US\$ 500,000.00.

The Middle East Chapter has held a number of group and One on One discussion with the Donors for commitment and payment of Zakath to meet this commitment. So far a sum of US\$ 340,000 has been received and of this a sum of US\$ 210,000 has been either received or sent direct to India/Pakistan.

We are confident the total sum of US\$ 500,000 committed by WMO Middle East Chapter will be collected and made available to the WMO CF for distribution before the year end

A much more organized and concerted effort is planned for next year with the Target of collecting a minimum of US\$ 2.0M from Middle East

a word from the Vice President

The years 2010 and 2011 have both been years of great tragedy for Pakistan due to heavy floods in various parts of the country.

The floods of 2010 destroyed/damaged more than 1.7 million homes, leaving some 07 million people shelter-less with heavy loss of belongings and livestock.

Thereafter, the floods of Sindh in mid-August 2011, resulting from heavy rains in Sindh, Eastern Baluchistan and Southern Punjab, caused considerable damage with an estimated killing of 270 civilians, rendering about 5.3 million people as shelter-less and destroying/damaging 1.2 million homes.

The immense scale of both the disasters continues to pose a huge challenge to the government and aid agencies even today.

The World Memon Organization has always been in the forefront during natural disasters and communal riots in any part of the world. Keeping up with this tradition, the World Memon Organization (Pakistan Chapter) got itself actively involved in the rescue and relief work of the flood victims during both years. After the floods of 2010 receded, the WMO has built new houses in Jaati, District Sajawal, and Sindh to rehabilitate the flood -affected families.

The Shaikhani Foundation (managed by the sons of Late Mr. Abu Baker Shaikhani, Trustee of WMO) has been working hand in hand with WMO for the rescue, relief and rehabilitation of affected families of both the floods. I take this opportunity to thank Mr. H.M. Shahzad, Chairman, WMO Flood Relief Committee and Mr. Mahmood Shaikhani, Chairman, Shaikhani Foundation for their untiring efforts.

It is worth mentioning that other organizations such as Deloitte Muhammad Yousuf Adil Salim & Co (MYASCO) have also joined hands with the World Memon Organization (WMO) and contributed large amounts for the rehabilitation of flood -affected families of 2010. The Rehnuma Trust and the Dhoraji Memon Association have also joined hands with WMO in the current year for the relief work. With the combined efforts of the above organizations, large quantities of ration bags, tents, Imedicines and other goods have been transported/distributed to far flung areas of Sindh from September 2011 onwards.

It is a welcoming signs that other organizations and institutions, both national and international, are taking interest in joining hands with WMO. This is not the case with just flood relief work. It is pleasing to note that WMO now has a large number of **Education Partners**-numerous schools, colleges and other top-level educational institutions along with Memon Jamats are supporting the Education for All and Scholarships for Higher & Professional Education Schemes of WMO Pakistan Chapter. Many Memoranda of Understanding (MoU) have been signed in this regard. Besides, many Memon Jamats are cooperating with the WMO Memon Census Committee in the collection and compilation of data of the Memon Community. The details of various types of partnerships can be found in Reports of the respective Committees.

One important landmark was the visit of the President of WMO, Mr. Abdul Sattar Dada (of Botswana) along with other international delegates to Karachi. Many programs and functions were hosted in their honor. The international delegation also had a meeting with the President of Pakistan, Mr. Asif Ali Zardari, in Islamabad.

The delegates were taken on a visit to the Memon Industrial & Technical Institute (MITI), Karachi,



where the foundation stone laying ceremony of Memon Institute of Hijama Therapy (MIHT) was formally held on 8th April 2011 by Haji Abdul Razzak Yaqoob, Founder-President of WMO, in the presence of the foreign delegates and many other distinguished guests.

The President of WMO, Mr. Abdul Sattar Dada, launched the WMO President's Housing Scheme at the Memon Get-Together, a mega event organized by WMO in Karachi on 10th April 2011. It is worthy to note that prominent members of the community made commitments for 30 houses, @Rs. 10 lakhs (US \$12,000) per house, at the function itself.

Talking about the Ladies - we have to mention with pride that the Ladies Wing of WMO Pakistan Chapter is doing extremely good work for the cause of women-welfare by holding various ladies gatherings and membership campaigns. They have been able to raise sizable amount of Zakat for the WMO Flood Relief Work, the WMO President's Housing Scheme and other projects of WMO Pakistan Chapter, for which we are very grateful to them.

The **Youth Wing** of WMO Pakistan Chapter is also doing extremely well. They have conducted two seminars called 'Think Wise' and 'Think Wise Too' for the youth in 2011 and also taken active part in the 'Memon Get- Together' and other events organized by WMO. The Youth are our assets and our future. We should always encourage them and facilitate them.

Under the Microfinance Scheme of WMO, Memon entrepreneurs doing small-scale businesses are provided interest-free small loans to promote their home-based small manufacturing or packing setups, petty shops, door-to-door sales or any other such small venture.

A new scheme in the name of Rozgar Scheme has been launched by WMO Pakistan Chapter during - May 2011. Under this scheme, Sewing Machines and Auto Rickshaws are provided to the needy. We are grateful to Mr. Farooq Ahmed of UAE for his initiative in this respect.

Other major projects of WMO Pakistan Chapter include the Rehabilitation Scheme (which provides housing for the shelter-less members of the Memon Community) and the Education for All Scheme (School Education) and the Scholarships for Higher & Professional Education. The WMO Pakistan Chapter is also supporting the Karachi Memon Students Organization (KMSO). Detailed reports of all the activities are part of this Performance Report.

The Pakistan Chapter is extremely grateful to the WMO Headquarters for their continuous support and encouragement. We are also thankful to all the philanthropists for their generosity and encouragement which makes the WMO Pakistan Chapter reach out to more and needier people.

I take this opportunity to thank my colleagues especially Mr. Pir Muhammad A. Kaliya (Secretary General, WMO), Mr. H.M. Shahzad, and all the Committee Chairpersons for their continuous support and hard work in advancing the cause of WMO.

In the end, I am thankful to Almighty Allah for His Blessings and Guidance and pray that He may guide us all to serve humanity in a more befitting manner. Ameen.

It is only by the Grace of Almighty Allah, that WMO Pakistan Chapter has been able to achieve some important milestones during 2011. I am presenting herewith highlights of the activities of WMO Pakistan Chapter.

Before I proceed further, I express my sincere thanks to all donors and well-wishers for their support, encouragement and generous monetary contributions to WMO, especially for the Flood Relief Fund and Memon Industrial & Technical Institute.

The Memon Industrial & Technical Institute has come a long way and achieved many important goals since its inception. Both the Boys Section and Ladies Section at MITI are doing well. Presently, about 1000 males and 3000 females are studying in various technical courses (22 courses for Gents and 13 different courses for Ladies).

The Memon Institute of Hijama Therapy at the Memon Industrial & Technical Institute (MITI), which was under construction, is now ready and already started its operations. The Institute will not only offer treatment to patients but will train male and female MBBS students in Hijama Therapy.

The Memon Alam, Monthly Magazine of the Memon Community, which is now published under the aegis of WMO, is dispatched to readers from all parts of the world. We request the readers to extend their support to Memon Alam by placing advertisements and becoming subscribers since it is a very costly affair to publish this magazine of international quality. We also welcome articles and news relating to the Memon Community for publication in the magazine.

The Rehabilitation Scheme is one of the largest projects undertaken by WMO Pakistan Chapter. It is indeed a very tedious and long task to deal with 7,225 applications which were received in 2004. As on 31st December 2011, 2,773 applications have been scrutinized with 4,452 applications still to go. Out of the 2,773 applications scrutinized so far, 1,407 applications are approved for financial assistance.

Another major scheme of WMO is the Education for All project wherein 7,184 school-going children are being provided with financial assistance. The Higher Education Scheme provides scholarship to 761 students who are studying in various graduate and postgraduate programs such as medicine, engineering, law, architecture, chartered accountancy, etc

An important scheme by the name of WMO Micro Finance Project, provides small interest-free loans to needy micro entrepreneurs of the Memon Community to help them to develop their business. The Rozgar Scheme, newly launched in May 2011, provides Auto Rickshaws and Sewing Machines to poor and deserving members of the Memon Community to help them earn a decent livelihood. We are extremely grateful to Mr. Farooq Ahmed of UAE for his initiative and financial support. The response has been overwhelming. So far, 408 applications for Auto Rickshaws and 454 applications for Sewing Machines have been received. We request the philanthropists and other well-wishers of the Memon Community to support this scheme so that poverty in the community is reduced.

As you are aware that the WMO Pakistan Chapter and the Shaikhani Foundation are working together for the alleviation of the sufferings of flood victims for the second year in a row. Details of the activities of the Flood Relief can be found in this report.

In order to carry out our regular welfare projects, WMO Pakistan Chapter depends entirely on the



donations and zakat received from the generous members of the Memon community, who live in Pakistan and abroad. We humbly request the donors and well-wishers to extend maximum support in the form of Zakat and Donations for various projects of WMO.

REPORT OF REHABILITATION COMMITTEE

Dear Brothers, I wish to draw your kind attention to the fact that the Memon Community is not so well off as we all think. The living conditions of countless Memon families are sub-standard, unhealthy and unsafe, and lack even the basic amenities of life. Most of the members of the Memon Community are victims of poverty, illiteracy and many other social evils. Moreover, the law and order situation in Karachi has made it very difficult and insecure for Memon families to live in certain parts of the city.

The WMO Pakistan Chapter is trying its best since many years to alleviate the sufferings of the poor and downtrodden members of the Memon Community.

In order to address the housing problems faced by the Memon Community, the World Memon Organisation launched the WMO Rehabilitation Scheme in 2004, which received an overwhelming response with 7,225 applications pouring in within a few weeks. The enormous amount of applications is itself proof of the existence of largescale housing issues faced by the Memon Community in Pakistan.

In the last eight years, the WMO Rehabilitation Committee has scrutinized and processed 2,773 out of the 7,225 applications and approved financial assistance to 1,407 applicants. This means WMO still has 4,452 applications to process.

The WMO Pakistan Chapter regularly holds an open house on Tuesdays to meet with applicants to review their status of applications and also listen to their woes. A visit to WMO House on a Tuesday will bring tears in your eyes when you listen to the pathetic cases of various applicants.

On an average, 10 percent of the families have one or two daughters who are divorced and live with their parents. It is difficult to imagine how they all live together in small houses along with their young daughters. It is painful to note that some families have put their daughters in orphanages.

The WMO Rehabilitation Scheme is run according to a clear-cut policy and consists of two



independent Sub-Committees namely Scrutinizing Committee and Approval Committee, which function as detailed below:

a). Scrutinizing Committee:

- To scrutinize the applications for assessing the financial position of the applicants.
- To interview the applicants and visit their residential premises.
- The Enquiry Committee Members shall visit the residence of an applicant to assess his/her need and priority in respect of the desired property.
- The Enquiry Form shall be properly filled-in, duly signed and dated by members of the scrutinizing committee.
- A separate file for each applicant is to be maintained and, on the recommendation of the Scrutiny Committee, the case shall be forwarded to the Approval Committee for their perusal.
- The Committee has spelled out preference criteria for granting financial assistance to those applicants who are widows and divorcees.

b) Approval Committee:

- The Approval Committee will review the files of all the deserving applicants and asses the merit of the cases, and finally approve the same after getting necessary clarification and information from the Scrutiny Committee.
- In case members of the Committee require further information regarding a particular applicant, the matter will be referred back to the Scrutinizing Committee for re-verification.
- After approval of the application, we will approach the concerned Jamat of each deserving applicant to ascertain whether the Jamat has already granted any financial assistance to the applicant for acquiring flat etc., and if not, to request the Jamat for any contribution in favor of the applicant.
- The successful applicant is then asked to find out a suitable flat on ownership basis within a specified period of time, which may be extended at the discretion of the Rehabilitation Committee from time to time.
- The entire documentation work plus registration of the Conveyance Deed is done by an Advocate, appointed by the WMO Pakistan Chapter. In certain cases, the Rehabilitation Committee may decide to convey the flat in the joint names of the applicant and his/her spouse.
- A "Check -List", as per specimen circulated amongst members, may be placed on each applicant's file so that the progress in such case may be ascertained at a glance.
- Original Property Documents will be retained by the WMO for safe custody. If a request is received from the applicant for return of the documents, the Committee will consider each case on merit and circumstances of the case.

The Rehabilitation Scheme is one of the largest projects under taken by WMO Pakistan Chapter. It is indeed a very tedious and long task to deal with 7,225 applications for acquiring house which were



received in 2004.

Till date 2,773 applications have been scrutinized with 4,452 applications still to go. Out of the 2,773 scrutinized applications, 1,407 have been given approval for financial assistance.

Initially, the WMO Rehabilitation Scheme used to provide a maximum of Rs. 400,000/- per applicant but this has been increased to Rs. 700,000 due to rising costs.

It is estimated that out of the 4,452 remaining applications, about 2,000 applicants will be provided with financial assistance for housing, for which an amount of Rs. 1.8 billion (US \$ 20 million) will be required.

REPORT OF THE EDUCATION FOR ALL COMMITTEE

World Memon Organisation (WMO), accepting the challenge, launched a scholarship program in 2008 for Memon students with the aim to educate each and every child of Memon community from Montessori to professional level.

It is observed that there are many social organizations of the Memon Community, which provide financial help in the form of scholarship to financially weak families for the education of their children in their limited resources. Due to their limited resources, they could not fulfill the entire need of needy students' educational requirements causing dropout of such students at different level of education.

WMO has started providing financial help to the students having no finance/limited finance for their educational needs. The scholarship program initially started in the year 2006 for the students seeking higher education. In July 2008, "Education for All Committee" was constituted nominating me (Qasim Moosa Lawai) as Chairman of the committee, supported by Mr. Shoaib Ghaziani, Mr. Abdul Majeed Abdani, Mr. Abdul Ghani Bhangda, Mr. Gul Muhammad, Mr. Salim Abdani and Mr. Ahmed Motiwala as members of the committee.

The main objective of the committee is to provide education to the Memon children who could not afford educational expenses due to nonavailability of the funds from Pre-Primary Level to College Level. In the month of August 2008, the Committee started functioning by calling applications from the needy and deserving families who did not receive sufficient educational help for their children from any source.

Aims and Objects

- Provide opportunities to financially weak students of the Memon Community to study up to effective Intermediate / A Level / Graduation in good Schools / Colleges of Karachi and Sindh.
- Create a competitive environment in the students of the Memon Community to achieve the academic excellence
- Provide opportunity to become well-groomed valued professional executives.

Policy and Procedure

An Execution Sub-Committee consisting of Mr. Qasim Moosa Lawai (Chairman), Mr. Shoaib Ghaziani, Mr. A. Ghani Bhangda, Mr. A. Majid Abdani and Mr. Salim Abdani will interview the parents seeking Financial Help. The committee will decide the cases on need basis after collecting all data from the parents, their respective Jamats, Associations and Donor Organisations

A. Preference Criteria

The Execution Sub-Committee will approve the scholarships to the students according to the following preference:

- 1. Students getting no financial help from any source including school scholarship.
- 2. Students getting no financial help from any source but getting concessions from the schools.
- 3. Students getting financial help from Pakistan Memon Education and Welfare Society (PMEWS).
- 4. Student getting financial help from Father's Jamat / Mothers Jamat.



- 5. Student getting financial help from both Father's and Mother's Jamat.
- 6. Student getting Financial Help from PMEWS and Father's or Mother's Jamat
- 7. Student getting financial help from PMEWS, Father's and Mother's Jamat.

B. Approval Criteria and Procedure

- 1. One of the parents must belong to Memon Jamat / Association, approved by The All Pakistan Memon Federation or United Memon Jamat
- 2. Original Census Form and Copies of NADRA New "B" Form, Report Cards, Fees Cards, Father's and Mother's CNIC and Jamat Cards are necessary to submit with the application.
- 3. Committee will call parents for interview
- 4. At least one of the parents should attend the interview.
- 5. The parents will bring all original documents with them for verification.
- 6. The committee will ask few questions regarding parent's monthly income, nature of work, financial help received from Jamats and Donating Organisations.
- 7. Committee will approve the Financial Help to the Student as per Preference List stated as above.
- 8. The committee will confirm the Various Fees Charged by the Schools and confirm the expenses of Uniform and Course Books from the parents.
- 9. The committee will grant the Scholarship after deducting Financial Help received from PMEWS, Jamats and other Donating Organizations.
- 10. The committee will issue Approval Letter to the Accounts Department for payment of Tuition Fees and Annual charges directly to the Schools and Uniform & Course expenses to the parents.
- 11. At the end of each Educational Year, the applicant will submit a copy of School Progress Reports of their children along with Renewal Form to the approval of the Financial Help for next Educational Year.

Scholarship Partners Program

A. One Window Operation

As stated above many Memon community Jamats / Association / Social / educational organization provide financial support to needy students in their limited resources. WMO has developed a system for providing financial help to such financially weak students for their educational needs. WMO requested all such organizations to join hands with WMO to process applications of students of all Memon Jamats at WMO and provide financial help to them through one window operation designed by WMO. One window operation will eliminate leakage of their funds due to multiple applications from applicants to various supporting organisations. This system will work as under:

- 1. According to this Program, WMO will call Scholarship applications each year through Scholarship Partner Jamats / Associations.
 - 2. Jamats / Associations will help students to complete their application forms and send the applications forms to WMO after verification.
 - 3. WMO will process all applications through its High-Tech computer system. WMO has right to reject any application without giving any reason, which is not qualified under its criteria.
 - 4. WMO will issue an approval letter of scholarship to respective schools/colleges and a copy to scholarship partners



- 5. Scholarship Partners will pay mutually agreed amount of their share to WMO on quarterly basis. WMO will pay balance-approved amount.
- 6. WMO will pay approved scholarship amount to respective schools/colleges directly on quarterly basis.
- 7. WMO will handle financial needs of applicants in its limit.
- 8. WMO will handle applicant's problems regarding their school/college.
- 9. Similarly, WMO has offered reputed schools to join hands with WMO by providing discount and educational facilities to WMO students and in return, WMO will provide good number of students to partner schools purely on merit basis.
- 10. In case if partner schools fail to provide quality education to WMO students, WMO will shift the students to another school.

B. Education Partners

Currently following Jamats / Associations and schools have joined hand with WMO to become Education Partners of WMO.

Negotiations are underway with other Jamats / Associations and Schools to join WMO Scholarship Partners Program, so as to enable us to give financial help to more and more students.

Report for the year 2008-09

During the month of Holy Ramadhan (September 2008), Computer Software was developed with the help of Mr. Shoaib Ghaziani and proper staff was recruited. The committee started processing 4694 applications received from the applicants out of which 761 applicants were from Non Memons, which were rejected.

The committee processed Balance 3936 applications, interviewing the families and processed the applications on fast track basis daily in the Holy month of Ramazan (September 2008) till November 2008. Committee approved 2256 applications for financial help costing Rs. 8,482,393/- (US \$ 107,604) for the period August 2008 - July 2009.

From October 2008, WMO started paying Tuition Fees, Annual Charges and other charges to the needy Students for payment to Schools and Educational institutes. Now from January 2009 committee started remitting all educational charges directly to the Schools and Institutes to avoid misuse of the fund.



Report for the year 2009-10

In April 2009, Committee started calling applications for scholarship from fresh and old applicants for the financial needs of their children regarding education for year 2009-2010. The Committee has received 4476 applications for financial help from the needy and financially deserving students. The committee has approved 4258 applications for scholarship and started remitting the fees directly to the schools costing approximately Rupees 28 Millions for the Educational Year 2009-2010.

Report for the year 2010-11

The committee started calling application of renewal from existing student's along with new applicants in March 2010 for the educational year 2010-11. The committee received total of about 6,300 applications seeking financial help for their educational needs for the year 2010-11.

After scrutiny the committee approved Rs. 38,466,739 (US \$ 447,288) for 5,592 applicants for financial help till 31st July 2011.

Report for the year 2011-12

The committee received a total of 7,800 applications seeking financial help for their educational needs for the year 2011-12.

After scrutiny the committee approved Rs. 61,608,523 (US \$ 687,595) for 7,223 applicants for financial help till 31st July 2012.

Forecast for the year 2012-13

The WMO Education for All Scheme estimates that there will be, Insha Allah, about 9,000 students for the year 2012-13 with an average fees of Rs. 1000 per month. An increase of 1500 to 1800 students is expected in the 2012-13 session because negotiations are underway with various Memon Jamats and it is expected that the students under these Jamats will come under the One-Window Operation of WMO, along with the other regular students who will come to WMO directly.

We are doing our best to sign Memoranda of Understanding with more Memon Jamats and Schools so that the present sharing of Rs. 9,727,960 (US \$ 106,900) can be increased. Therefore, the estimated amount for academic session of August 2012 to July 2013 comes to Rs. 108,000,000/-(US \$ 1,186,813).

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SCHOLARSHIPS FOR HIGHER EDUCATION & PROFESSIONAL EDUCATION

The World Memon Organisation, Pakistan Chapter (WMOPC), has been striving since 2004 to help the youth of the Memon Community acquire career-oriented graduate, post-graduate and other professional qualification.

Under this Scheme, financial assistance of up to Rs. 100,000 (approximately US \$ 1,100) per calendar year is given to each needy and deserving Memon student, on basis of past academic performance/results.

This assistance, which is provided from the Zakat fund, is given in the shape of direct payment of fees to educational institutions. Further, any additional expenses such as purchase of books, transport, etc may be given in very special cases.

The criteria for disbursement of financial assistance is as follows:

- a) The beneficiary must be a member of a recognized Memon Jamat;
- b) The beneficiary must be eligible for financial help from the Zakat fund;
- c) The beneficiary must have an admission offer from a recognized and well reputed educational institution; and
- d) The beneficiary's past academic performance justifies the level of the financial assistance sought. The following table shows the percentage of financial assistance given to the student out of the total requirement of fees, on the basis of academic performance of the student:

e) In case the student fails in a particular paper/semester/term, the WMO does not pay his/her fees for that term and the student has to bear the expenses himself or herself until a satisfactory result is achieved.

Students seeking financial assistance are required to complete a comprehensive application form and submit it with the required supporting documents. The students are called for interview within one week of the submission of the application.

The Higher & Professional Education Committee holds weekly interviews of the students seeking the financial assistance and the applications for the financial assistance are dealt with. Disbursements of the funds are made within two weeks of the interview.

For the year 2011, from 1st January to 31st December 2011, over **Rs.14,407,288 (US \$ 160,800)** have been spent for the purpose of the higher education by WMOPC.



We recall that as on 31st December 2008 the number of students receiving the financial assistance was only 148. Since then, the Committee has stepped up its efforts and the result is that the number of the beneficiaries has gone up to 779, an increase of 525% in three years. WMO is providing financial assistance to students pursuing 49 different courses of study.

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WMO MICROFINANCE SCHEME

The Microfinance Scheme of WMO Pakistan Chapter was launched in the year 2009 with the support of some of the honorable Trustees and Patrons of WMO.

The Scheme has been designed to help poor and needy small-scale entrepreneurs of the Memon Community and encourage them with small loans to buy more goods and increase the scope of their business.

The Scheme was initially run on a trial basis wherein about 40 entrepreneurs were given loans of up to Rs.10,000/- each. These loans were repaid by the applicants in 12 easy installments of Rs.833/- per month or installments of Rs.1000/- in 10 months.

In 2012, the Microfinance Scheme of WMO continues to provide loans of up to Rs. 10,000/- to first-time applicants. Besides the above, WMO is following-up the micro entrepreneurs of previous years who have repaid their loans and has provided some of them with bigger loans of up to Rs. 25,000/-. Some of the entrepreneurs of previous years are doing their small-scale businesses extremely well and have also proved their honesty and commitment to repay the loan on time. Therefore, the WMO Micro Finance Scheme has provided them with a bigger loan of up to Rs.25,000.

Introduction

Harnessing the Potential of Memon Women The women of the Memon Community are bestowed with immense talent and the Ladies Wing is striving to encourage them to serve the less fortunate members of the Memon Community under the banner of WMO.

For this purpose, the Ladies Wing regularly holds get-togethers, seminars, functions and other such gatherings where awareness about WMO is created and efforts are made to bring the women of the Memon Community together on a single platform and motivate them to devote their time and energy for social work and charity. Such programs and get-togethers also provide a forum for dialogue and discussions with women of similar interests. They also help create awareness of issues pertaining to the women workers themselves and to the entire Memon Community at large. Such get-togethers offer the women an opportunity to interact with other members of the organization share ideas and undertake constructive social work for the community.

The women of the Memon Community, especially those from affluent families, have always responded positively to the efforts of the WMO Ladies Wing. This is evident from the number of new lady members to WMO. The members of the WMO Ladies Wing are also involved in fundraising for various events and projects. Activities & Events of WMO Ladies Wing during 2011

- 1. The WMO Ladies Wing has been actively engaged in collecting funds and relief goods for the Flood Relief Work in 2010 and 2011. So far, a considerable amount has been collected by the Ladies Wing besides donations in kind. Till date, an amount of Rs.1,627,500/- (US \$ 18,500) has been collected for the Flood Relief Work and goods worth about Rs. 150,000 (US \$1700) have been also collected.
- 2. WMO President's Housing Scheme: The Ladies Wing had been actively collecting donations with the aim to finance one house under the WMO President's Housing Scheme. And Al Hamdulillah, the WMO Ladies Wing has now collected PKR 1 million (USD 12,000) to fully finance one house under this scheme.
- 3. Matrimonial: The Ladies Wing continues to help parents find suitable matches for their children in a very confidential manner and great care is taken in protecting the identity of each individual. A number of marriage relationships have also been finalized.
- 4. JAGO Women Power Conference This conference was a call to women in positions of power to stand up against the issues and social injustice faced by the women of the Memon community. The purpose of the conference was to motivate and encourage the women in key positions to come forward and act as a bridge between the privileged and deserving. The conference was held in two parts. The first part was held in January, 2011 and was sponsored by Ms. Ajjo, a leading Fashion Jewelry Designer. The Conference was dedicated to

- empowering women to bring hope, healing and changes into their own lives and to the world around them and served as a call to women of all ages and backgrounds to become the leaders. The second part of the conference was held in March, 2011 at a member's residence.
- 5. Cricket World Cup: The ladies wing had successfully arranged a very festive Get-together at the Royal Palm where the semi-final cricket match between Pakistan vs India was shown live on big screens. A variety of food stalls were also setup at the venue. The event was attended by a large group of youngsters along with their parents.
- 6. Grand Eid Milan: This was a Bowling and Brunch Get-together for the WMO members to share the Eid festivities. The event, held on 17th September 2011 at Royal Rodale Club, Karachi, was a roaring success where over 100 ladies and guests attended the event.
- 7. Recently, a Fashion Show titled "Symphony of Fashion" was organized by the WMO Ladies Wing on Saturday, 17th December 2011 at South End Club, Defence, Karachi. The aim of this event was to promote lady designers of the Memon Community and give their creativity and skills a proper exposure. An Exhibition was also arranged along with the Fashion Show, where the participating Memon women set up their stalls to exhibit their handiwork. The exhibited items included garments, handicrafts, art work, homes accessories and many other items. The members of the Ladies Section, Memon Industrial & Technical Institute (MITI), a project of WMO, also took part in the Exhibition.

Self-Funding

The WMO Ladies Wing has always strived to generate funds, through registration fees and tickets, for most of its programs and events and does not depend entirely on WMO for funding. Only if the case need be, a small share has been sought from WMO. Al Hamdulillah, the WMO Ladies Wing has raised the funds for all its programs this year and has not asked WMO for any help.

Other Projects Under Process:-

- 1. LearnFest A Learning Festival with multiple talks and seminars.
- 2. White Elephant Sale It is expected to be held in 2012, which will help generate additional funds for the various programs being managed by WMO Ladies Wing.

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KARACHI MEMON STUDENTS' ORGANISATION (KMSO)

The Karachi Memon Students' Organisation (K.M.S.O.) is a very famous Study Center of the Memon Community situated in Bombay Bazaar, Karachi. The Study Center has been helping students with all necessary facilities along with a library for nearly five decades.

Since the K.M.S.O. was facing financial difficulties, the Management of K.M.S.O. had approached the then Secretary General of WMO, Mr. Abba Ali Yousuf for financial grant.

The WMO has pledged to provide financial aid for recurring expenses and also for maintenance and renewal of the Study Center. So far, WMO has given a grant of Rs. 1,442,872 (US \$16,035) to K.M.S.O. since 2008.

Hundreds of students are taking the benefit of studying in a peaceful and pleasant atmosphere of the newly renovated K.M.S.O. Study Center.

CENSUS OF THE MEMON COMMUNITY

It is now sixty-four years since the great exodus of the Memon Community from the Kutch, Gujarat and Kathiawad regions of India. The Memons are now spread all over the world, with concentration in cities like Karachi, Mumbai, Surat and few other parts of India, Pakistan, Sri Lanka, United Arab Emirates, Europe and Africa. However, the exact number of Memon families and individuals is unknown.

In these modern times, every society and community has the need to have the basic information about its members for purposes of planning, development and improvement of the quality of life of its members. In spite of some serious efforts made by some Memon welfare organizations and Memon personalities, no proper population count of the Memon Community is available. It is still anybody's wild guess about the number of Memons living around the world.

A Population Census of the Memon Community is a need that had to be addressed immediately and that is why WMO has taken the initiative. A far reaching decision was taken by the Board of Management of World Memon Organisation (WMO), at a Meeting held at Mombassa in July 2004, to conduct a thorough population census of the Memon Community around the world.

The statistical and demographic information collected from the census will be helpful in many, many ways. It will help in identifying demands for schools, colleges, hospitals, houses, jobs and other infrastructural facilities which are crucial for the growth and well-being of our Memon community.

The census data collected will also provide statistical information about the Memon Community, such as age-groups, literacy level, socioeconomic status of Memon families, unemployment rate, demographic concentration, divorce rates, health issues, etc. The data will also help the concerned to reach out to the poor and needy Memon families. All those concerned with the welfare and well-being of this community will be able to make concrete long-term plans for the betterment of the Memon Community based on this data.

Regarding the progress of the WMO Memon Census Committee, the Memon Census Project is an ongoing process and so far data of over 33,200 families (145,594 individuals) has been collected which is a representative sample of the entire Memon population in Pakistan. Besides, data of about 10,000 families (50,000 individuals) is under process of verification and cross-checking.

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Memon Industrial & Technical Institute (MITI)

It has been a little more than 2 years since Memon Industrial and Technical Institute (MITI) opened its gates to students in June 2009. During this period, the management has remained focused towards the goals charted by the founding fathers of WMO and MITI.

These inter alia included providing affordable and quality vocational education to the youth of low income group and continuous improvement in quality and services of the Institute while strictly adhering to the WMO principles of charity, welfare and service to humanity.

These objectives cannot be attained simultaneously with commercial success and the financial viability of MITI is linked to the philanthropic assistance of WMO and other organizations that are referred to as our partners in this report.

Although it is not possible to achieve any kind of financial independence without sacrificing the ideals for which MITI was built, economic considerations take priority in all operations of MITI with the objective to lessen the burden on the donors. And by the Grace of Allah SWT, we are successfully progressing in that direction by cutting on expenditure and increasing admissions.

During 2011, MITI remained focused on increasing admissions. Several initiatives in this regard are summarized below. The efforts were quite successful as the results show admissions steadily increasing to 1500 and 4000 in the Boys' and Ladies sections respectively by end 2011. Since its inception, more than 15000 boys and ladies have benefitted from the facilities of MITI.

New Initiatives

- a) New Courses were added in the Curriculum in both Boys and Ladies Sections.
- b) Existing Facilities were improved and Capacity was increased.
- c) Promotional Activities were undertaken to increase awareness about MITI.
- d) Registration with Trade Testing Board was completed.
- e) Evening Classes were started.
- f) MITI web site was launched.
- g) Relationships with partners were strengthened.

a) New Courses Added in 2011

A number of new courses were introduced with special emphasis on I.T. As such a completely new well equipped IT section was constructed with all facilities including audio visual equipment under well qualified teachers. In the future this is destined to become the Flag Ship of MITI Insha Allah.

f) Parent Teachers' Meeting


The first ever Parent/Teacher Meeting was held this year in which the parents and the faculty discussed the progress of their children. The initiative was well appreciated by the parents and students.


g) Web-site Launching

MITI launched its web site www.wmomiti.com from July this year.


Results:






They appreciate that similar facilities in the country charge heavy fees for such trainings but WMO and MITI have made it possible for the most needy and deserving people to get training in vocational skills with minimum financial burden on the families. WORLD MEMON ORGANIZATION (PAKISTAN CHAPTER) NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED DECEMBER 31, 2011

01. GENERALINFORMATION

World Memon Organization (Pakistan Chapter) is a company registered with Securities and Exchange Commission of Pakistan (SECP) as a foreign company (liaison office) under the Companies Ordinance. 1984 on April 14, 2003. The registered office of the company is situated at London.

The principal activities of the company is the promotion, advancement, upliftment, unity, welfare and wellbeing of the Memon community.

1.1 Functional Currency

The financial statements of the company is presented in Pakistani Rupees, which is the functional and presentational currency.

02. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

2.1 Statement of Compliance

These financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the requirements of Companies Ordinance, 1984 and directions issued by the Securities and Exchange Commission of Pakistan, and approved accounting standards as applicable in Pakistan. Approved accounting standards comprise of such International Accounting Standards as notified under the provision of the Ordinance. Wherever, the requirements of the Ordinance or directives issued by the Securities and Exchange Commission of Pakistan differ with the requirement of these standards, the requirements of the Ordinance or the requirements of the Said directives take precedence.

2.2 Basis of Preparation

These financial statement have been prepared under historical cost convention.

2.3 Revenue and Expenditure Recognition

- (a) Revenue is recognized on the following basis:
 - Annual members (Ordinary/Apex/Institutions/Corporate) on accrual basis
 - Life members and patrons Evenly over 10 years
- **(b)** Expenses are accounted for on accrual basis.
- (c) Interest income and expense is not recognized and treated as a liability. The net amount charged in the income and expenditure account is donated for charitable purpose according to the Islamic principles.

2.4 Property and Equipment

Property and Equipment except lease hold land are stated at cost less accumulated depreciation. Depreciation is charged to income applying the reducing balance method at the rates specified in respective note.

Depreciation is charged from the month of addition up to the month following the month of disposal/derecognition.

Maintenance and normal expenses are charged to income and expenditure account as and when incurred.



Gains and losses on disposal of fixed assets is recognized in the income and expenditure account.

2.5 Cash and Cash Equivalent

Cash and cash equivalents are carried in the balance sheet at cost. For the purpose of cash flow statement, cash and cash equivalents consist of cash in hand and balance with banks.

2.6 Other Payable

Liabilities for other payable are carried at cost which is the fair value of the consideration to be paid in the future for goods and services received whether billed to the company or not.

2.7 Other Receivable

Other receivables are carried at committed amount less an estimate made for doubtful receivables based on review of outstanding amounts at the year end. Balances considered bad and irrecoverable are written off when identified.

2.8 Impairment

The company assesses at each balance sheet date whether there is any indication that assets except differed tax assets may be impaired. If such indication exists, the carrying amounts of such assets are reviewed to assess whether they are recorded in excess of their recoverable amount. Where carrying values exceed the respective recoverable amount, assets are written down to their recoverable amounts and the resulting impairment loss is recognize in profit and loss account. The recoverable amount is the higher of an asset's fair value less costs to sell and value in use.

Where impairment loss subsequently reverses, the current amount of an asset is increased to the revised recoverable amount but limited to the extent of the initial cost of an asset. Reversal of impairment loses is recognized as income.

The gain or loss on disposal or retirement of an asset represents by the difference between the sale proceeds and the carrying amounts of the asset is recognized as an income or expense.

2.9 Financial Instrument

Financial assets and liabilities are recognized when the company becomes a party to the contractual provisions of the instrument and de-recognized when the company loses control of contractual rights that comprise the financial assets and in the case of liability when the obligation specified in the contract is discharged, cancelled or expired.

2.10 Intangible Assets

Intangible assets include improvements carried out on MITI building and have finite useful lives are measured at cost less accumulated amortization less impairment in value, if any.

Amortization is recognized in income and expenditure account on a straight line basis over the period of five years.

2.11 Foreign Currencies

Transactions in currencies other than Pakistani Rupees are recorded at the rates of exchange prevailing on the dates of the transactions. At each balance sheet date, monetary assets and liabilities that are denominated in foreign currencies are retranslated.

Gains and losses arising on retranslation are included in income and expenditure account for the period.



The likeness of those who spend their wealth in Allah's way is as the likeness of a grain which grows seven ears, in every ear a hundred grains. Allah gives increase manifold to whom He will. Allah is All-Embracing, All-Knowing.

Indeed Almighty Allah has sent human beings on this earth as his servants and has raised them to the highest level of being the "Best of His Creations". Man cannot serve as Allah's servant unless he fulfils his duties both towards Allah and mankind.

The World Memon Organisation (WMO) is an international representative organization of the Memon Community established to cater to the needs of Memons spread across the world and to address various issues faced by the Memon Community at the global level.

The objectives of the WMO is to act as a central worldwide organization representing the entire Memon Community for the promotion, advancement, uplift, unity, welfare and well-being of all Memons in all aspects of life and at all times in accordance with Islamic principles.

The WMO strives for the eradication of any disadvantages and all forms of discrimination faced by the Memons, and co-operates with such national and international organizations having similar aims. The WMO fosters better community relations between all religious, social, ethnic and national groups for the good of the society as a whole. It works for the alleviation of poverty in the Memon Community and improves the quality and standard of living of its members, in addition to projecting and promoting the dignity, language and culture of all Memons.

2001

At the highly successful 1st International Memon Convention held on 28th and 29th April 2001 at Dubai, on the proposal of Late Mr. Abdul Razzak Tasty, Late Mr. Latif Ebrahim Jamal, Mr. Abdul Razzak ARY, Mr. Abu Bakar Qasim Pardesi and Mr. Adam Noor, it was unanimously resolved that an International Organisation of the Memons shall be established for the uplift and advancement of the Memon Community. This was the beginning of a new era of selfless and dedicated serviced to the



Memon Community in particular and humanity in general.

A Steering Committee comprising of members from various countries was formed at the first Convention for the preliminary drafting work of the Constitution and other relevant documents. This task was successfully accomplished by the Steering Committee.

2002

On 30th March 2002, the Draft of the Constitution was presented at the 2nd International Memon Convention for discussion and adoption. By the Grace of Almighty Allah, the World Memon Organisation (WMO) was formally inaugurated at the 2nd International Memon Convention held in Dubai on 30th and 31st March 2002. This inauguration was witnessed by over 200 delegates from 19 countries. This was a unique and memorable event in the history of the entire Memon Community.

The Convention was declared open by Mr. Sultan Ahmed Bin Sulayem, the Executive Chairman of the Ports, Customs and Free Zone Corporation, Government of Dubai. In the welcome address, Haji Abdul Razzak Yaqoob (ARY) said that "the roots of the Memon Community dates back to the eighteenth century. Now in the twenty-first century, we have decided to create a single platform for the Memons worldwide in order to assist them in building a better life not only for themselves but for others as well. We want the world to acknowledge the Memons as a respectable community as there are over one and a half million Memons around the world. The WMO would help them unite under one umbrella" he said.

At the 2nd International Memon Convention, the delegates unanimously approved the name of the international body as 'The World Memon Organisation' and adopted its Constitution and Standing Orders. The 65-member Steering Committee was sworn-in as the first Board of Management of WMO. Haji Abdul Razzak Yaqoob (ARY) was elected as the Founder-President of WMO.

It was also unanimously decided to incorporate the World Memon Organisation Charitable Foundation (WMOCF) a

At the Convention itself, the WMO collected US\$ 500,000 for the affected families of the ethnic violence of March 2001 in Gujarat, India. This was the first ever fund raising by WMO even before its formal inauguration.

Later in the year, the World Memon Organisation (WMO) was formally registered in England and Wales with the Registrar of Companies on 25th September 2001. Similarly, the World Memon Organisation Charitable Foundation (WMOCF) was registered with the Registrar of Companies in England and Wales on 3rd December 2001.

2003

WMO was registered in Pakistan on 14th April 2003 with the Securities and Exchange Commission of Pakistan.

The 1st Annual General Assembly Meeting of WMO was held in Karachi on 23rd December 2003, which was inaugurated by Mr. Shaukat Aziz, the then Finance Minister of Pakistan.

On 30th December 2003, a delegation of WMO met with Their Excellencies, President of Pakistan, General Pervez Musharaf and the Prime Minister of Pakistan, Mir Zafarullah Khan Jamali, to brief them about the welfare activities of WMO and its mission. The delegation was assured support by the Government of Pakistan.

In the same year, WMO donated a generous amount to an upcoming mega healthcare project of the



Memon Community - the Memon Medical Institute (MMI) in Karachi.

2004

WMO held its 2nd Annual General Assembly Meeting on 10th July 2004 at Mombassa, Kenya. This meeting was inaugurated by the Kenya's Minister of Culture Mr. Najeeb Balala. A delegation of WMO also had a meeting with Kenya's President, His Excellency, Mr. Mwai Kibaki.

As part of the worldwide awareness campaign, Road Shows were held in different cities of the United States of America which included New York, Chicago, Houston, Miami and Los Angeles.

One of the mega projects of WMO in Pakistan is the Rehabilitation Project, launched in 2004, under which 7,200 applications have been received. So far, WMO has processed about 2,500 applications and provided financial assistance to over 1,400 needy and distressed families for acquiring flats and houses. Nearly 4,700 needy families are still awaiting for their turn for which a huge amount of over 20 million US Dollars would be required. WMO is indebted to many donors, particularly the Kothawala and Amdani Families, for their support to the WMO Rehabilitation Scheme.

Similarly, the WMO India has provided houses / flats to a large number of Memon families from its inception till date. There are a large number of distressed Memon families in India who are in dire need of financial assistance for acquiring houses / flats, for which WMO India needs an equivalent amount of 20 million US Dollars. WMO desperately appeals to the philanthropists

2005

WMO held its 3rd Annual General Assembly Meeting on 26th March 2005 in Mumbai, India. The meeting was inaugurated by Mr. E. Ahmed, Union Minister of States for the Ministry of External Affairs of India. A delegation of WMO also met with His Excellency, Dr. Man Mohan Singh, Prime Minister of India.

On 27th March 2005, awards were distributed to Memon personalities for their outstanding social work.

The earthquake of 8th October 2005 caused great destruction and loss of life in both India and Pakistan. WMO started relief work from the very first day and sent a delegation, led by Mr. Shoaib Ismail Mangroria, to the affected areas. The victims of the earthquake were provided food, medicine, shelter and clothes. WMO also set up a medical camp at Islamabad.

Later on, WMO constructed 290 houses with the help of local residents and distributed to the needy victims of the earthquake. WMO also constructed a school, mosque, clinic and water facilities for the affected people and helped them to restart their lives afresh. The Memon community from around the world set an everlasting example by donating US\$1.5 million for the earthquake relief and rehabilitation work.

2006

WMO held its 4th Annual General Assembly Meeting at Colombo in Sri Lanka on 20th May 2006. It was inaugurated by Sri Lankan Minister of Enterprise Development and Investment Promotion, Mr. Rohitha Bogollagama.

On this special occasion, a documentary film "International Memon Unity" produced by WMO Pakistan chapter was exhibited. The Documentary Film's Script Writer Mr. Abdul Hameed Tayyab Suriya and Presenter Mr. Abdul Sattar Mohammed Jhakura were honoured with gold medals. A delegation of WMO had a meeting with Sri Lankan President, His Excellency, Mahinda Rajapaksa.

The Dubai Government issued a licence to WMO for its welfare activities in the Middle East.

In the mid of 2006, a grand dinner was hosted by WMO Middle East Chapter in Dubai in honour of 8 dignitaries who had received civil awards.

The United Kingdom is a place where lot of Memons have settled. The Memon Association of UK has been offering valuable social services since many years. The Memon Association UK has established a matrimonial service called 'Memon Connection' to help Memon families from around the world. Under the Social & Welfare Health Committee, a Professional Help-Line has been created with doctors, lawyers, accountants, etc in order to provide free advice to those in need.

During the same year, road shows were held in various cities of Africa like Lilongwe, Malawi, Durban and Pretoria to promote the universal Memon brotherhood.

Sir Iqbal Sacranie, an internationally renowned Memon personality from UK, paid a two-day visit to Karachi in mid 2006. The WMO Pakistan Chapter arranged a grand reception on 25th June 2006 in his honour.

Education is the key to prosperity for any nation or community. The WMO Pakistan Chapter launched its Higher & Professional Education Scheme in 2006 to provide financial assistance to Memon students. WMO recognizes the importance of education and has decided to allocate 60% of its funds to provide financial assistance for Education in Pakistan, India and other parts of the world.

The World Memon Organisation was formally registered in Sri Lanka on 12th December 2006.

During the same year, the WMO acquired a bungalow in Karachi, Pakistan and named it as WMO House, where the Pakistan Chapter of WMO is presently situated. This is the place from where numerous welfare projects of WMO have been launched for the benefit of the poor and needy.

2007

The WMO produced a documentary film titled "Diya Jalaye Rakhna" portraying the contribution of the Memon community in various fields over the centuries.

WMO held its 5th Annual General Assembly Meeting on 14th April 2007 at Karachi which was inaugurated by Mr. Shaukat Aziz, the then Prime Minister of Pakistan. Other Federal and Provincial Ministers also attended. On this occasion, Mr. Abdul Sattar Edhi was honoured with a Lifetime Achievement Award for his selfless services to humanity. The Prime Minister of Pakistan, Mr. Shaukat Aziz, said very encouraging words about WMO and the Memon Community:

A mega event, The "Memoni Get-together" was arranged on 14th April 2007 to express the unity and solidarity of the Memon community. Over 4,000 people, including foreign delegates, attended the event. While addressing the gathering, the President of WMO, Haji Abdul Razzak ARY said:

The WMO India Chapter had taken initiatives to help the poor, especially the widows. The schemes include Women Empowerment Program, Housing Scheme, Medical Aid and Education Assistance Scheme. The WMO contributed a large amount of US\$162,000 for a housing scheme in Hyderabad, India. WMO also extended its support to other Memon Jamats in India including the "Surat Memon Jamat". Under the Economic Uplift Scheme, 60 auto rickshaws and a large number of sewing machines were distributed to the needy families.

In the meeting of the Board of Management held in March 2007, great emphasis was placed to harness the talents of Memon Women and Youth. It was decided to form a Ladies Wing and Youth



Wing at each chapter of WMO.

In this year, the WMO was approved as a Non Profit Organization (NGO) under Income Tax Ordinance of Government of Pakistan.

2008

A delegation of WMO Middle East Chapter had a meeting with His Highness, Sheikh Nahyan Bin Mubarak Al Nahyan, the Minister of Higher Education and Scientific Research, UAE on 2nd April 2008 to apprise him about the welfare activities of WMO. The delegation also requested for allotment 100 acres of land in the UAE for the establishment of a world class Memon University. The Minister assured WMO for allotment of land.

The WMO held its 6th Annual General Assembly Meeting on 25th May 2008 at Dubai which was inaugurated by His Highness, Sheikh Nahyan Bin Mubarak Al Nahyan, the Minister of Higher Education and Scientific Research, UAE.

During the same year, WMO Africa Chapter was registered as a non-profit organization and a decision to establish a WMO Centre at Laudium, Pretoria was announced.

To encourage the Youth of the Memon community, the WMO facilitates sports events in its various chapters from time to time. In Sri Lanka, the WMO sponsored the WMO Challenge Trophy at the 8th Annual Memon Cricket Carnival on 29th June 2008, organized by the Memon Association of Sri Lanka. The Youth Wing of WMO Pakistan Chapter organized the 1st Cricket Open Trials at Karachi on 28th December 2008. About 250 Memon cricketers took part. Eight teams were selected.

A WMO Colony was constructed with 24 units under the WMO Far East Chapter and handed over to Memon families in Sri Lanka during November 2008.

Education is the key to a brighter future. A new scheme - Education for All - was launched by the WMO Pakistan Chapter on 4th August 2008. Up till now, thousands of school-going children have been benefited by the Education Schemes in India and Pakistan at a total cost of over 20 million US dollars. Besides, over 5000 students have been provided financial assistance to pursue their higher and professional education.

2009

WMO held an Extraordinary Annual General Assembly Meeting on 14th February, 2009 in Durban, South Africa to make some necessary amendments in the Constitution of WMO. Also an amount of US \$ 4 million was raised for the poor and underprivileged members of the Memon community around the world.

The 7th Annual General Assembly Meeting was held on 13th December, 2009 in Dubai.

A Microfinance Scheme was launched at the WMO Pakistan chapter. The Scheme provides interest-free loans to small-scale Memon entrepreneurs to help them increase the scope of their business.

On 23rd November 2009, a Memorandum of Understanding was signed between WMO and the Memon Alam Trust whereby MEMON ALAM, a monthly magazine of the Memon Community published for more than five decades, was taken over by the WMO and Mr. Pir Muhammad A. Kaliya was assigned the duties of its chief editor.

2010

Any society or community cannot progress without women playing an effective role. The WMO has



established Ladies Wings in its chapters in Pakistan, India, Sri Lanka, Africa and Dubai which are holding functions, seminars and get-togethers on a regular basis.

The Ladies Wing of WMO Pakistan Chapter also participated in the South Asian Association for Regional Cooperation (SAARC) fair held on 6th March 2010 at Karachi.

On 17th March 2010, the Ladies Wing organized a seminar with the name of "Together Everyone Achieves More" (TEAM) and a 'Mothers and Daughters Gathering' under the theme "Mere Angney Main" to facilitate suitable marriage proposals.

The WMO stepped forward to lend a helping hand during the destructive floods in Pakistan of July 2010 which affected over 21 million Pakistanis. The WMO established a Flood Relief Fund and commenced the relief activities along with Shaikhani Foundation. A base camp was established in Karachi from where relief goods were sent to the flood affected areas. An amount of nearly One Million US dollars was spent to help the victims.

A tent village was established in Gharo, Sindh under the supervision of Mr. H.M. Shahzad and Mr. Mahmood Shaikhani, which provided refuge to 1400 affected people. They were provided with food supplies and other necessities. Medical personnel were made available to them for any health related issues.

The Members of its Board of Management of WMO paid a visit to this camp on 19th September 2010 to enquire about the well-being of the flood affected families.

On 1st May 2011 and 10th June 2011, the WMO and Shaikhani Foundation, under its Flood Rehabilitation Scheme called MERA NAYA GHAR, distributed 111 newly constructed houses in District Sajawal to the flood affected families of 2010 floods. In this noble initiative, Muhammad Yousuf Adil Salim and Company also provided financial help.

When the floods came for the second time in August 2011, WMO was among the first to distribute food, tents, medicines and other relief goods to the flood victims in the districts of Badin and Sanghar, Sindh.

The WMO Pakistan Chapter sponsored the publication of a historical book by the name of "Taarikh-e-Pakistan ke Gumshuda Auraaq" (The Lost Pages of Pakistan's History), written by Mr. Abdul Aziz Ismail Markatiya. The launching ceremony was held on 15th October 2010.

The 8th Annual General Assembly Meeting of WMO took place in Colombo, Sri Lanka on 12th December 2010.

The youth of Memon community is blessed with great potential and talent. WMO is trying to provide the youth with an ideal platform to groom themselves for a better future and prepare them to serve the community in a befitting manner.

To encourage sports and to facilitate the highly skilled players to play on a national level, cricket trials were held on 28th December 2008 and 21st March 2009. The T-20 Cricket Tournament was held in March 2010.

On 15th August 2009, the Youth Wing Pakistan Chapter arranged a mega event titled "*Panjho Mustakbil Kuro* (What is our future?)" where over 6,000 members of the Memon community attended which included several distinguished guests.



On 27th March, 2011, the Youth Wing of WMO Pakistan Chapter organized a seminar with the name of "Think Wise". The success and popularity of the program paved the way for another seminar titled as "Think Wise Too", which was held on 20th November 2011. Both the seminars were highly informative and motivating.

The World Memon Organisation has setup a mega project by the name of Memon Industrial and Technical Institute (MITI) which is a state-of-the-art technical and vocational training centre based at Korangi, Karachi. On 8th March 2008, a Memorandum of Understanding was signed between WMO and the City District Government of Karachi for the establishment of the technical training institute as a joint venture.

The City District Government Karachi handed over Civic centre III in Korangi, Karachi, which has been built on 7 acres of land and having covered area of 136,000 square feet, for the purpose of establishing the proposed vocational and technical institute of WMO.

Mr Haji Abdul Razzaq ARY and Mr Majeed Ali Muhammad provided generous donations to initiate the project. On 31st May, 2009, MITI was inaugurated by the City Nazim, Syed Mustafa Kamal.

At present, men are trained in 26 different trades and women are being trained in 17 different trades at the Memon Industrial & Technical Institute. In all, over 6000 students which includes 1500 men and 4500 women are trained in various trades without any distinction of caste, creed or religion. We wish to thank Mr. Abdul Rauf ARY of Khwaja Ghareeb Nawaz Welfare Trust for the generous contribution for establishing the Ladies Section at MITI.

MITI has now become an Institute of international repute where thousands of people are getting skill-based training to pursue a fruitful career. Every year, this institute provides technical training to over 18000 people. Till date, MITI has provided technical training to 23,000 individuals. It is expected that, within the next three years, the MITI would be providing technical education to over 30,000 students annually.

This has been made possible only due to the continuous support and encouragement of various national and international donors for which WMO is extremely grateful. The WMO is obliged to Haji Abdul Razzak Yaqoob (ARY), Founder-President of WMO, for his able guidance to MITI. WMO greatly appreciates the untiring efforts of Mr. H.M. Shahzad, Chairman, MITI along with his team consisting of Mr. Pir Muhammad Kaliya, Mr. Shoaib Ismail Mangroria, Mr. Abdul Rashid Godil, Mr. Qasim Lawai, Mr. Ghaffar Pidha and Mr. Shahab Raja

The City and Guilds International has recognized MITI as one of its International Centres for Technical Training.

MITI is regularly visited by different delegations from Government and non-government institutions.

On 28th April 2011, the British High Commissioner, Mr. Adam Thomson and Deputy High Commissioner, Dr. Peter Tibber visited MITI and were quite impressed with the infrastructure and facilities available at the Institute. Mr. Adam Thomson expressed his views in the Visitors' Book as under:

"What an impressive institution MITI is! It's model holds great potential for Pakistan's future success. It has been a privilege to learn about its work.

The Consul General of the Federal Republic of Germany, Dr. Tilo Klinner, visited the Memon



Industrial and Technical Institute on 19th November 2011. He was accompanied by Mrs. Nasreen Jaleel, Ex-Naib Nazima, CDGK and Mr. Abdul Rashid Godil, MNA. The Consul General of Germany has offered assistance to MITI in providing specialized training in Automobiles and Electronics in the near future.

A high-level delegation from Japan along with Pakistan Engineering Development Board (EDB) visited MITI on 5th May 2010 and appreciated the high standards and performance of MITI.

MITI has now become a Centre of Excellence and a landmark project of the World Memon Organisation (WMO), which is striving for the benefit of humanity at large without any discrimination of caste, creed or religion.

2011

In April 2011, to review the welfare activities carried out by WMO in Pakistan and India, the President of WMO, Mr Abdul Sattar Dada, along with a high level delegation, paid a visit to Pakistan and India.

On 3rd April, 2011, Abdul Sattar Dada met with one of the founders of WMO, Mr Adam Noor, who is residing in India and enquired about his health and well-being.

On 5th April, 2011, a high-level delegation of WMO met with Indian President, Their Excellencies, Srimati Pratiba Devi Singh and Vice President, Mr. Hamid Ansari. The WMO Delegation apprised them of the welfare activities of WMO in India and other parts of the world. Their Excellencies were impressed by the welfare activities of WMO.

On 7th April, 2011, the President of WMO and high level delegation was received and given a grand welcome when they reached Karachi on their tour of Pakistan. The foreign delegation paid a detailed visit to MITI and a grand ceremony was held at MITI in their honour. On this occasion, the President of WMO distributed shields amongst successful students of MITI.

At this juncture, the foundation stone of "Memon Institute of Hijama Therapy", was laid by one of the Trustees of WMOCF, Mr. Jan Muhammad Gandhi. The Institute of Hijama Therapy will provide treatment of various illnesses in accordance the Sunnah and will also provide training in this field.

On 8th April, 2011, the delegation along with some members of the Board of Management of WMO and distinguished personalities of the Memon community, met the President of Pakistan, Mr. Asif Ali Zardari. The President of Pakistan was very kind to extend the lease of MITI from 30 years to 99 years. The President was very appreciative of role of the Memon community in Pakistan in the economic development and social welfare of the country.

On 10th April, 2011, a Gala Dinner was arranged in honour of the President of WMO and the foreign delegates. On this occasion, gold medals were awarded to Haji Abdul Razzaq Yaqoob ARY (Founder President of WMO), Mr. H.M. Shahzad (Assistant Secretary General of WMO Pakistan Chapter and Chairman of MITI) and Syed Mustafa Kamal (Former City Nazim, Karachi) for their selfless service to WMO and MITI. Around 4,000 guests attended this dinner.

The WMO Pakistan Chapter launched the WMO Rozgar Scheme in May 2011 whereby Sewing Machines and Auto Rickshaws are provided to the poor and needy Memon families.

The WMO was registered in India as an independent body on 7th June 2011.

The World Memon Organisation (WMO) is now recognized as the central representative body of the



Memon community around the world. The WMO has taken a giant step in promoting education among the Memon community, be it in India, Sri Lanka, Pakistan or any other part of the world.

The welfare activities of WMO are supported by Memon philanthropists, donors and well-wishers from all parts of the world. WMO is extremely grateful to all of them. Without their wholehearted support, it would not have been possible to achieve so much in the first decade of its existence.

The WMO now looks forward to expand its scope of philanthropic activities in the second decade and serve the humanity in a more befitting manner.
